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### County Council

Nov. 2nd, 1910.  
Council met at call of the Warden, pursuant to adjournment. All members present except Mr. McQuillin.

Minutes of former meeting were read. Parsons-Bain-That the minutes be adopted as read. With the change that the word "police" be struck out of resolution dealing with recompense to magistrates for examining lunatics etc. Carried.

The following communications were read: From the Warden, instructing the Clerk to call a meeting of the Council; from R W Bruce Smith, re commitment of idiots to the asylum; Do., re payment of Government grant to House of Refuge; from Dr. Baxter, re Monarch Typewriter; from Mr. Grant, re Monday due the County re Parks from Mr. Armstrong, re cost of sewer.

Shaver-Pyle-That the report concerning the purchase of the typewriter for the Registry office be received and read. Carried.

Report of the Purchase of the Typewriter for the Registry Office.

To the Warden and Members of the Council of the County of Haldimand.

Gentlemen, A Monarch typewriter, with an 18 1/2 inch carriage, has been purchased for the Registry office at a cost of \$125. The contract agreement accompanies this report.

Parsons-Smelser-That we adjourn to allow the different committees to meet. Carried.

Bain-Parsons-That the Treasurer pay amount of County grant to Agricultural associations on receipt of certificate that Fair has been duly held. Carried.

Bain-Smith-That the report of the Special Committee, re House of Refuge sewers, be received and read. Carried.

Report of the House of Refuge Sewer Committee.

Gentlemen of County Council-Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:

1 That the County Council proceed to lay down sewer to County House of Refuge and connect with Dunnville sewer provided satisfactory arrangements can be made with the Council of Dunnville.

2 That the Council of Dunnville be asked to pass a by law empowering the County Council to lay a sewer pipe along the centre of Broad street from the House of Refuge farm, to connect with the town sewer at Centre street, and to make all excavations therefore that may be necessary, and to collect rate from property owners in the town of Dunnville for the use of said sewer, or make such other agreements with them as they and County Council may deem best.

3 That the right be reserved by the Council of Dunnville to purchase said sewer from the County of Haldimand at a valuation to be ascertained at the time of purchase.

4 That an agreement be entered into

between the town of Dunnville and the County of Haldimand to carry the terms of the by-law into effect and that the same be attached to the by-law as a schedule thereto.

5 That a Committee, composed of the following members of County Council-Messrs. Parsons, Bain and Cline-be appointed to confer with the Council of Dunnville on the matters above reported, and if arrangements can be made satisfactory to the committee they shall make a provisional agreement in order that the work may be begun at once.

6 Upon such agreement being made, the committee shall at once proceed with the work by contract or otherwise as they deem best and for the purpose of carrying out the work the committee shall have power to enlarge itself.

7 The committee first mentioned may associate with themselves if they deem it advisable the Clerk of the County.

8 And that until the town of Dunnville purchase the said sewer it shall be the property of the County of Haldimand and the County may at all times enter upon and break up the said street for the purpose of repairing or inspecting the said sewer or doing such other things as may be necessary for the purpose of maintaining the said sewer.

9 And that the committee have power to deal with such matters that may arise not heretofore mentioned as they may deem best.

10 And that this Council pass a by-law to do the said work at its first meeting or confirm the same to be done.

Gentlemen-We, your Road and Bridge Committee, beg leave to offer our report as follows.

The approaches to the Spring Creek bridge have been macadamized at a cost of \$71.20. The Mississauga Council agreed to pay one-quarter of the cost of said work and the Clerk is requested to ask W C VanLoon, Indian Agent at Hagersville, to pay \$18.81, and also send him a certificate that the amount has been paid by the County, \$71.20 for the work.

Upon examination the bridge over the Norfolk and Haldimand, it was found to be in a very dangerous condition. It was decided to build a new superstructure estimated at a cost of \$400. Each County to pay half.
