Death of Matthew Johnston

The angel of death with its relentless sickle removed one of our aged residents, and hence another spirit has wended its way to where no weary traveller ever returns. We refer to Matthew Johnston who passed away on Wednesday morning at his home on Church street, at the age of 73 years, 4 months and 9 days. Deceased was born in Ancaster Township, near Toronto, in 1835, and in 1867 led Miss Elizabeth Miller to the altar. They resided on a farm near here up to twenty-five years ago when they moved to town. Mr. Johnston has never enjoyed robust health for about ten years, but has always been up and around until two weeks previous to his demise when he was obliged to keep to the house, owing to an attack of pneumonia, and that, coupled with a weak heart, ebbed his life away on the above day. He was a consistent member of the Presbyterian church, was a kind friend and obliging neighbor and he will be much missed in our midst.

He is survived by his sorrowing partner in life, two sons, John and James of Jarvis, and two daughters, Mrs. Brennan, of St. Thomas, and Mrs. Dawson, of MacLeod, Alta. The funeral took place on Friday afternoon, and after an impressive service in the Presbyterian church, the remains were laid to rest in the burying ground. The sympathy of the entire community is extended to the bereaved widow and family, in this their sad hour of sorrow and bereavement.

Canada Cement Company Reduced Prices.

The price of Cement has been lowered. This announcement may come as a surprise to many—for, when Mergers merge, the opposite tendency is usually looked for, but this time the unexpected has happened. About a year ago most of the largest cement interests joined hands and formed one company, known as The Canada Cement Company, Limited. It was immediately predicted, in many quarters, that prices would be advanced, that on account of the big merger the consumer would have to pay dear for his cement in future. The promoters of the Company, on the other hand, stoutly contested this theory, pointing out that owing to reduction of expenses and increased efficiency, they hoped to be able to give even cheaper cement than ever before.

The first move on the part of the Cement Company was to regulate the price of its product, and it was an agreeable surprise to everyone when it was learned that in making the adjustment, prices were not unduly advanced. That was last year.

On the 1st of November, this year, a circular was sent out by the Canada Cement Company, further reducing the price of its product through out the entire Dominion on an average of about 10c per barrel.

This reduction means a whole lot and proves beyond doubt the sincerity of the statements made by the promoters, when the Company was yet in embryo.

Christmas Shopping is on.

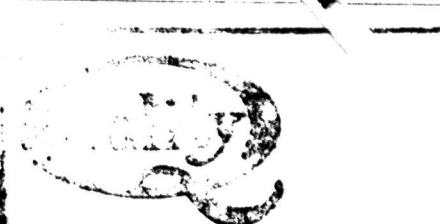

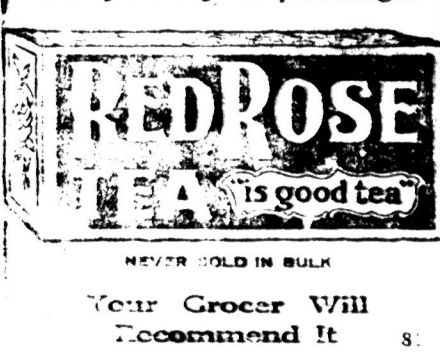

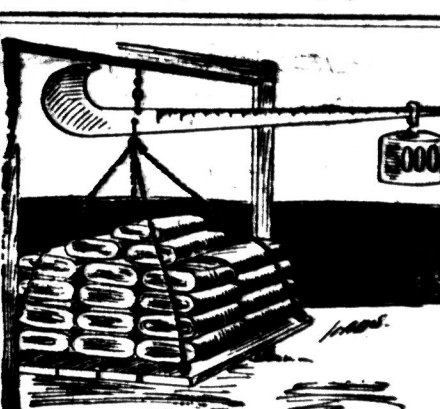
