An Ottawa despatch says: The intention of the Canadian Northern Railway to sooner or later extend their lines into the thickly settled part of Canada, Western Ontario, was shown in a notice of application to appear in the Gazette to-day. The Mackenzie & Gannett Company, ask power to construct the following lines: "From within ten miles east of Toronto to Hamilton, London and Windsor, with a branch from London to St. Thomas and Sarnia, and a loop line in the townships of York and Scarborough, north of Toronto; from the International Bridge northwesterly to Goderich, from between Dunnville and Port Dover to Owen Sound or Meaford." The Buffalo, Niagara & Toronto Railway desires extension of time for construction.

Dust Laying at Owen Sound

The sandy lake shore soil, upon which Owen Sound is located, results in very dusty streets. No matter how much rain falls, or how much water is sprinkled on the streets, in an hour thereafter the dust becomes a nuisance and a menace to health. To overcome this, the municipal authorities, early in the spring, experimented with oil, which proved such a success that now all the principal streets in the centre of the town are oiled. These thoroughfares are macadamized and as a preparation for oiling, are first swept clean and oil put on immediately after with the sprinkler.

The objection at first was that the odor from the crude oil was offensive, but in a day or two this disappeared, and the change for the better to dustless streets was recognized by all. The first application of oil lasted six weeks, and the second application was put on the other day, and what were some of the dustiest streets are now perfectly dustless.

The town officials state that it will be an annual saving of \$2,000 over the old water system, and at the same time give much better results. It did another good thing in banishing mosquitoes, heretofore a great annoyance, none being now in evidence where the streets are oiled.

Spare The Birds.

The United States farmers are being warned by the Audubon Association that the 17-year locusts are to descend on the continent both north and south probably next spring. This cicada has frequently caused enormous damage, and the birds are the best protection farmers and orchardists have against it. Only two specimens of birds examined by the Washington authorities were found not to feed upon it. English sparrows, robins, woodpeckers, orioles, scarlet tanagers, cuckoos, gold finches and nuthatches have rendered the greatest service in devouring these periodical cicadas on their previous raids, according to the records of the Government Biologists' survey. We are not beyond danger of injury by the pest.


