TAKING INDIA BY REE. Something About a Religious Society of the Punjab the Arya Somaj.

A thing one very quickly learns in India is to take it in bits. The political movement in Bengal, Bombay and the Punjab presents differences of method and outlook which must influence conclusions about Indian nationalism—a subject of particular interest at the present moment.

Lahore is the capital of the Punjab, and the centre of its political activities. Here one meets among leaders Lajpat Rai, and among organizations the Arya Somaj. Moreover, as in the Punjab, the Hindu and the Mohammedan practically balance each other; it is in the Punjab that one can best understand the difficulties which must beset a nationalist movement in India. When one has gone around the Arya Somaj school and college in the morning under the guidance of the Somaj leaders, interviewed the reception committee of the Indian national congress in the afternoon, dined with the Moslem League in the evening, and filled in the interstices with interviews with British officials, one begins to understand the intricacy of Lahore—e. g., Punjab—politics.

The centre and source of Punjab activity is the Arya Somaj, and its propaganda is the Anglo-Indian officials it is regarded as a political body—as a society which has some occult creed, and which pursues its way under cloaks of deceit. Commissioners and deputy commissioners, district magistrates, collectors and policemen regard the Arya as a seditious organization, and indictments have been known to be made against men solely on the ground that they belonged to this society, and they have been bound over to keep the peace because they were found preaching its doctrines. The Arya has therefore come to consider itself persecuted; it is glorying in the fact, it records its tribulations with flourishes of trumpets in every issue of its official organ, it appeals for support for its ideal when they are arrested—and the Punjab officials play in the most innocent way into its hands.

The Arya Somaj is purely a religious society and was founded to carry out the teachings of Swami Dayanand Saraswati, one of the many holy men who arise in the course of a generation in Hindu religious life. Born in 1824, the Swami died in 1883. In a sentence or two his teaching was directed toward bringing Hindu religion back to the purity of the Vedas. The worship of idols had deteriorated the Hindu and had led to all manner of social evils. The rule of caste should be broken, early marriages should be ended, education, in accordance with classical Hindu method should be given to the people. In this there was nothing new. It was one part of that characteristic revival of the ancient ways, which is going on in India to-day. India is returning to herself through the pathway of the West.

But the Swami inculcated a spirit as well as a doctrine. Part of his revolution was that the Aryans were the chosen people, the Vedas the chosen gospel, in India the chosen land. Auster, independent, dogmatic and puritanical was his character, and he imparted these qualities to his followers. You meet them, therefore, to-day in Lahore, their capital city, determined, ready to sacrifice and be sacrificed, propagandists of an accomplished order. They are opposed to the Mohammedans, they attack both. They ask no favors from the Government; they do nothing about the "verandas" of commissioners. Their one thought is to convert India to their views.—From the London Chronicle.

The following articles are estimated to cost 1 cent: One teaspoonful of wine, teaspoonful of vanilla, teaspoonful of oil of clove, two of tea, one of soda, one of spices, two of cream of tartar. Salt and pepper are usually used in too small quantities to be estimated. For 2 cents one teaspoonful of brandy, one tablespoonful of grated chocolate, one carrot, one turnip, one large onion, one tablespoonful of coffee, one tablespoonful of gelatin.

Minard's Liniment Cures Burns, Etc. WORTH KNOWING. Mud stains can be usually removed from silk by soft rubbing with a bit of flannel. If this fails, saturate a piece of linen with alcohol and apply gently. Fresh fruit stains can be removed from linen by boiling water. Place the stained part over a bowl; pour boiling water through it from a tea kettle held at some height above it. Old stains must first be soaked in cold water, then use the hot water. Try vinegar for all lime spots which refuse to yield to ordinary treatment. For grease spots use powdered magnesium sulfate or bicarbonate of soda. Sprinkle the spots thoroughly and leave until grease is absorbed. Repeat if necessary. Soot from an open chimney or dropped from stove pipes can be removed by covering thickly with salt. Brush it up and cover again if traces still remain. A child who has outgrown his high chair, but for whom the ordinary chair is still too low, is now using one of the dining room chairs with small rubber bumpers screwed on the legs. These raise the chair just enough. The rubber bumpers are found among the small things of housefurnishing departments.

SQUASH COOKERY. Summer squash is considered by health authorities one of the best vegetables that can be eaten. It is best during the fall season, when the plants are mature, it is most easily digested and can be served in a number of ways that will prevent it becoming monotonous on the bill of fare. Baked Summer Squash—One of the unusual ways of cooking summer squash is to bake it. For baking, wash but do not pare the squash. Make a hole in the top and scoop out seeds, stuffing the hole with chopped squash or cabbage or celery and green peppers chopped finely. Serve with melted butter; they are delicious this way.

Mashed Squash—To serve squash mashed, pare and cut in two-inch cubes. Cook in a little water as possible until tender. Drain and place on back of range tightly covered, allowing them to steam a quarter of an hour, then mash. Add lump of butter and serve. Steamed Squash—Steamed squash is the best way of preparing it from a health standpoint, as in this way all its natural juices, so good for the system, are retained. Cut pared squash in sections, place in steamer and let remain until soft. Either mash or not as preferred, and serve with hot melted butter poured over.

Squash Hollandaise—Or pour over hot Hollandaise sauce for a delicious and unusual vegetable dish when entertaining or when a particularly nice dish is wanted at low cost and little trouble.

Recipes

CARAMEL GUSTARD. One pint milk, one-fourth cup sugar, three eggs, one-fourth teaspoon salt. Boil half the one-half pint cold milk, add to them the sugar melted in a frying pan until it smokes. Pour this mixture slowly into the boiling milk, and boil till it begins to thicken. Remove and set away to cool. Serve ice cold.

BAKED HADDOCK OR CODFISH. After the fish is scaled and cleaned, put in force-meats, and sew up. Bake with butter, eggs and crumbs. Bake about one hour, if large, half an hour if quite small. Serve with melted butter or a brown gravy. Garnish with lemon-slices.

CELERY AU GRATIN. Put in baking dish left-over creamed celery; sprinkle with crumbs and bits of butter and cheese, and bake pale brown on top.

ICE JELLIED BOUILLON. Make a beef bouillon or a consommé, and clear it with egg white and shell. To each quart of the hot bouillon add one tablespoonful of granulated gelatine soaked until soft in half a cupful of cold water. When the gelatine is dissolved, strain into an earthen bowl. Let it cool and then put it in the refrigerator for twelve hours. Carefully skim off any fat, when it should be a perfectly clear jelly, ice cold. To serve take it up in a small after-dinner coffee spoon and half fill bouillon cups.

TEA JULIP. A delicious substitute for the "cup that cheers," and one quite suitable for serving at afternoon tea, is prepared as follows: Pour a pint of boiling water upon an eighth of a pound of mixed good Oolong and Young Hyson, proportioned half and half, adding a half-pound of pulverized sugar, the juice of three lemons, two sliced oranges and a stick of cinnamon. Allow the infusion to become quite cold and place in a quart of strawberries and a pint of any preferred carbonated water and serve in slender crystal glasses that have been half filled with cracked ice.
