Walpole Fall Fair

The 56th annual exhibition of the Walpole Agricultural Society, held on the Fair grounds, Jarvis, on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week, was not the success it usually is on account of the very disagreeable weather. The first day rain fell at intervals all day, and there was a steady down pour from about nine o'clock Wednesday morning until late at night. Shortly after one o'clock the Directors, who were on the grounds, met to consider the advisability of postponing the Fair, but it was decided to go on and do the judging as there was a large exhibit of livestock on the grounds. The exhibit of horses and cattle were as large or larger than usual and of a far better quality. The sheep and swine exhibit were small but good, and the poultry exhibit equalled other years. The exhibits in the halls were not as large as usual but were fully up to other years in quality.

The horse races, although we understand a number of entries had been made, had to be withdrawn as the track was in no condition on account of the rain.

The wet weather stopped hundreds of people attending the Fair and concert as will be seen by the amounts received, gate receipts, \$89.00, concert, \$44.85.

The Directors of the Society, in the rules and regulations, reserve the right to pay only a percentage of the premiums in case of bad weather. It is not known yet, as there has been no meeting held, but it is to be hoped that the Directors can see their way clear to pay all premiums in full, and that the prize winners will contribute their prize money or part of it back to the Society; and that the people of Jarvis and Walpole will contribute liberally and make up the deficit so as not to cripple the Society for next year.

Russell and Fitzgott are among the best and the concert throughout was thoroughly enjoyed by all.
