Walpole Agricultural Society, held on the Fair grounds, Jarvin on Tuesday and Wednesday of het week, was not the success it usually is on account of the very disagree-able weather. The first day rain fell at intervals all days, and there was a steady down pour from about nine o clock Wednesday morning until late at night. Shortly after one o clock the Directors, who were on the grounds, met to consider the advisability of postponing the Fair, but it was decided to go on and do the judging as there was a large exhibit of live stock on the grounds. The exhibit of horses and cattle were as large or larger than usual and of a far better quality. The sheep and swine exhibit were small but good, and the poultry exhibit equalled other years. The exhibits in the halls were not as large as usual but were fully up to other years in quailty.

The horse races, although we understand a number of entries had been made, had to be withdrawn as the track was in uo condition on account of the rain.

The wet weather stopped hundreds of people attending the Fair and concert as will be seen by the amounts received, gate receipts, \$39.00, concert, \$44.85.


