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MARKET REPORTS

TORONTO MARKETS. LIVE STOCK. The quality of cattle both in butcher and feeder classes as a rule was not what would be desired.

Common light weight cattle predominated in numbers, and these have been slow sale all week.

Good butchers, of which there were few, and good feeders, which also were scarce, held about steady in price.

Butchers--Three choice picked butchers were sold by Maybee & Wilson, 1-130 pounds each, at \$5.80, and these are all the butchers' cattle we heard of selling at that price.

Feeders--Good feeders, 950 to 1,050 pounds, \$5.20 to \$5.30; feeders, 800 to 900 pounds, \$4.50 to \$5; stockers, \$4 to \$4.50.

Milkers and Springers--The market remains firm for good milkers and forward springers at \$50 to \$80 each; a few common sold at \$40 to \$45. Late springers are slow sale.

Veal Calves--Receipts of calves were light with prices steady to strong at \$3.50 to \$8 per cwt, and a few odd new milk fed veals brought \$8.50.

Sheep and Lambs--Receipts of sheep and lambs were liberal, but prices remained about steady. Sheep, ewes, sold at \$4.50 to \$5 per cwt; rams, \$3 to \$3.50; lambs, sold from \$3.30 to \$4.35 per cwt.

Hogs--Receipts for the two days were 3,549. The market closed weak with the prospect of another drop in price. Sows, feds and watered, today sold at \$8.50, and \$8.15 to drovers for hogs f.o.b. cars at country points.

FARMERS' MARKET. The grain offerings to-day were about 600 bushels, of which 500 were barley, which sold at 55 to 60 per bushel.

Wheat easy, 100 bushels selling at 87c. Hay in fair supply, with prices firm: 25 loads sold at \$17 to \$20 a ton for timothy and at \$12 to \$16 for clover and mixed. Straw is quoted at \$16 a ton for bundled.

Dressed hogs are unchanged, with quotations ruling at \$11.50 to \$12.00. Oranges, case, \$3.50; Grape fruit, case, \$5.00; Lemons, case, \$4.00; Bananas, bunch, \$1.50; Peaches, basket, \$0.75; Apples, basket, \$1.00; Plums, basket, \$1.00; Apples, bbl., \$1.50; Watermelons, each, \$0.15; Grapes, basket, \$0.15; Canteloupes, crate, \$0.25; Potatoes, sweet, bbl., \$3.50; Tomatoes, basket, \$0.25; Peppers, red, \$0.60; Onions, Spanish, case, \$2.50; Cranberries, bbl., \$8.00; Beans, Lima, per lb., \$0.06.
