Pushed Down Stairs
Delhi, Oct. 25.—During a Police Court trial which was being held in the Council chamber to-day, above the postoffice, the Magistrate ordered the constable to clear the room. Constable McNally of Simcoe, in attempting to do so, pushed some of those standing at the top of the stairway and Mr. Henry Ryder, an aged and respected farmer residing close to the village, was standing part way down the stairs when he was pushed over by those above him. He fell to the bottom of the stairway, striking on his head, and died shortly afterwards. An inquest will be held.

Arrested at Goderich
Goderich, Oct. 26.—The jury was out for three quarters of an hour and brought in the following verdict: "That the said Elizabeth Jane Anderson came to her death on the night of Sept. 20th, at the town of Goderich, by having her throat cut with a sharp knife or similar instrument, and the evidence submitted points strongly to Edward Jardine as having committed the crime." While the jury were out Edward and Thomas Jardine sat together on a bench surrounded by other witnesses, but taking part in the conversation. When the verdict was read Chief Postlewaite took Edward Jardine into an ante room and held him while a warrant was being sworn out. Thomas Jardine's arrest will follow shortly.

Breaking the Game Laws
Notwithstanding that the open season for black and grey squirrels is only from Nov. 15 to Dec. 15, they are being slaughtered in this section by amateur sportsmen who are perhaps ignorant of the law, and do not realize that by the infraction of it they leave themselves liable to a heavy penalty. The game warden should get busy in this section. Open seasons for the following are:
Pheasants, partridge from 15th day of October to the 15th day of November, both days inclusive.
Black and grey squirrels from the 15th day of November to the 15th day of December, both days inclusive.
Ducks of any kind from the 15th day of Sept. to the 15th day of December, both days inclusive.

Keep Out the Paper
"Keep it out of the paper" is the cry which the local newspaper publisher daily hears. To oblige, often costs considerably though the party who makes the request sinks the granting scarcely worth saying "Thank you" for. A newspaper is a peculiar thing in the public eye. The news gatherer is stormed because he gets hold of one item, and is abused because he does not get another. Young men and often young women as well as older people perform acts which become legitimate items for publication, and then rush to the newspaper offices and beg the editor not to notice their escapades. The next day they condemn the same paper for not having published the same thing they were guilty of, forgetting apparently their late visit to the printing office.

Traction Engines and Bridges
Several municipalities have been having trouble with owners of traction engines who pay very little attention to bridge over which they drive their machines. A decision handed out recently by the Court of Appeal at Toronto is of importance. In effect it holds that no traction engine can go over a bridge without laying plank. If one does so, any damage resulting will be chargeable to the owner of the engine. In the case in question the Goddard Thresher Company brought an action against the township of McNabb for damage to an engine under eight tons in weight, by the collapse of a bridge. No plank was laid, but the plaintiff contended this was not necessary and the only reason for laying plank was to protect the floor of the bridge. The court held, however, that without laying plank such an engine has no right on a bridge and must suffer the consequences, and not only dismissed the plaintiff's action but gave the township \$77.90 for damage done to the bridge.
