A Significant Celebration. The Halifax correspondent of the Globe

The bi-centenary celebration has a profound significance not merely in its relation to the Anglican Church, but as an historic event of incalculable importance in the history of the Dominion. All Saint's Cathedral is intended to be a memorial of stone of the first recorded instance of a Protestant service according to the Anglican ritual in what is now known as the Dominion of Canada. It was a service of thanksgiving for the victory of British arms over the French held in the old French fort of Port Royal latter known as Annapolis Royal, having been so named in honor of Queen Anne. in whose reign the sixth and the final capture of the Fort took place. It is of historic interest, then, because it mark the beginning of continuous British rule in what is now Canadian Dominion.

· The date of the service was Tuesday, October 10th, old style, in the year of our Lord 1710, and in the reign of Queen

The officiating clergy were Rev. John Harrison, chaplain of Commodore Martin of H.M.S. Dragon, who read the prayers, and Rev. Samuel Hesker, chaplain of the Hon. Colonel Reading's marines, who preached the sermon. Rev. John Harrison became the first English chaplain to the garrison, and in 1720 he was chosen by Governor Phillips as one of the first Councillors of the Province of Nova Scotia.

The officer in command, under whose orders this military service of thanksgiving was held, was Colonel Francis Nicholson, a soldier who was spoken of at the annual meeting of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in 1713 as "a person who has deserved well of the of the society in his several stations, for his love to the ministry and for his lay ing the foundations of churches." He was at'various periods of his career Gov ernor of no less than five British colonies. having been Lieutenant-Governor of New York under Edmund Andros from 1687. 1689, of Virginia from 1699 1705, of Maryland from 1694-1699, of Nova Scotia from October 12, 1712, to August 1717, and of South Carolina from 1721 1725.
