The Methodist Conference

At the Conference in Victoria an exciting debate took place on the question of amusements and especially the foot note which was added to the general rules of the Methodist church a few years ago forbidding dancing, playing at games of chance, encouraging horse races, etc. During the past twelve years efforts have been made to eliminate this foot note but without success. At the last Conference in Montreal a commission was appointed to deal with the question and this committee brought in a report recommending an explanation as to John Wesley's intention respecting the general rules to take the place of this foot note, but a motion was carried obliterating the footnote and leaving the general rules as they are. By a vote of 220 to 35 the Conference adopted the recommendation of the Committee on Church Union and thus expressed approval of the basis of the union of the Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational churches and sent it on to the Annual Conference, District Meetings and the membership of the church for consideration and action. This almost unanimous vote of the Conference augurs well for the fate of the union proposals when presented to the people, and as the governing bodies of the other churches have expressed approval of the membership of the negotiating churches is all that is necessary to make a union of these churches a certainty. Canada is showing the way to the world in many ways, but in none more prominently than in this matter of church union.
