

THE PEPPERMATOL

A Queer New Vegetable Raised by a Tennessee Farmer.

Henry P. Cole, a prosperous farmer of this vicinity, promises to rival the great Burbank in marvellous feats of plant raising. His latest innovation is combination tomato and pepper plant, which will enable the lover of the delicious fruit to abandon the antiquated method of using pepper, it being only necessary to slice the new product and it is ready for use.

The tomato patch from which the freak tomato was taken is in close proximity to a field of peppers, and it is supposed by the plant raisers of this section that the pollen of the two was mixed during the blooming season. The physical construction of the "pepperma-to." as it has been locally dubbed, is peculiarly interesting

As if taking into consideration the tastes of every one, nature so arranged the fruit that the pepper part may be separated from the tomato and those who fear the ill effects of pepper upon human vitality may raise the fruit market purposes and at the same time remove the pod from the few which they may personally consume.

The peppermato resembles the proverbial Siamese twins, being a perfect specimen of the tomato species, to which is grafted a full pod of pepper. It is thought that the new plant involves principles which will be of interest to scientists.-Humboldt correspondence Memphis News-Scimitar.

AUTOMOBILE INDUSTRY

Four Hundred Million Invested in

Motor Cars. Much has been said first and last regarding the magnitude of the automobile industry, but figures prepared by some of the leading automobile authorities really give a much more concrete idea of the extent of this latest indus trial development than can any general descriptive terms

It is estimated that there is to-day invested in automobile plants about \$400,000,000 and that at least 20,000 persons are employed in the manufacture of automobiles or their accessories. The automobile makers are paying to the railroads of the country between \$25,000,-000 and \$30,000,000 annually for freight and consume over \$60,000,000 of rubber steel, iron and aluminum.

There are in daily use in the United States at present approximately 350,000 automobiles. The 1909 production may be placed at 180,000 cars, with an approximate value of \$240,000,000.

Large as these figures are, they are exceeded by the annual expenditure for horse-drawn vehicles. Reliable authorities estimate that there are over 7,000. 000 of these vehicles used daily in the United States, while the total number of horses and colts in the country exceeds 21,000,000 besides 3,000,000 mules. American manufacturers produce yearly about 1,700,000 vehicles, of which 940,000 are passenger conveyances, with an estimated value of \$110,000,000. In addition there is a yearly expenditure of \$125,-000,000 for horses and \$52,000,000 for harnesses, so that it seems fair to asyearly for its horse vehicles a total of 9200.000 000

Automobile makers claim that already the automobile has displaced 500,000 horses and wagons, the average unkeen of which is 65 cents a day, compared with the average upkeep for an automobile of 30 cents a day.

Rice Rolls in India.

The most important of the agricultural industries of India is the cultivation of rice, of which a number of varieties are produced, differing in size, shape and color of grain, as well as in suitability for culinary purposes. More than 70,000,000 acres are annually put under rice in India, and samples of all the varieties produced have recently been analyzed by Dr. David Hooper. One of these is peculiar in that it is too glutinous to be boiled in the ordinary way. This difficulty is avoided by boiling it in bamboo tubes, and after being thus prepared, it is left in the tubes to be eaten cold, especially by travellers. When the rice is to be eaten, the bamboo is peeled off and a long roll of rice an pears, which forms an excellent substitute for bread.
