Painter; Addresses, by Dr. Abbott and Mr. Laughton; Trustees' Representative on the Advisory Council; Construction Work, Forms 3 and 4, A. J. Painter. Fifth Session, 1.30 p.m., Address by Dr. Abbott and Mr. Laughton; Question Drawer; Resolutions.
