MARKET REPORTS

TORONTO MARKETS.

LIVE STOCK.

The eastern cattle, of which there was a large number, were an inferior lot, and harder to dispose of than at any market this season.

There was a good trade for any cattle that had anything approaching medium to good quality, at steady prices, but the inferior and common mongrels were slow sale at 20c to 30c per cwt. lower prices than on Tuesday last...

Fat cattle.—The bulk of the best butchers on sale sold from \$5 to \$6.00; 3 choice cattle of export weight brought \$6.25 and four or five more were sold from \$4.25 to \$5; cows, \$3 to \$4.75...

Stockers and feeders.—Trade was steady for good quality, but lightweight common quality steers were 20c to 30c per cwt. lower. Best steers, 900 to 1,100 lbs., sold at \$5.25 to \$5.80 and \$5.70; steers, 500 to 800 lbs., at \$4.25 up to \$5 per cwt.

Milkers and springers.—There was a quiet market all week for milkers and springers of good quality. Prices for a firm at \$40 to \$75 each Thursday. There were three Montreal and Quebec buyers of milkers and springers...

Veal calves.—Receipts moderate; prices firm at \$3.50 to \$7.50, with a very few new milk fed going at \$8 to \$8.50.

Sheep and lambs.—Receipts of sheep and lambs were heavy, especially the latter. There were 4,822 sheep and lambs reported for the two days, which caused a slight break of 15c to 20c per cwt. for lambs...

Hogs.—Selects, fed and watered at the market, sold at \$9.10 and \$9.70 to \$9.75 f.o.b. cars at country points to drovers.

FARMERS' MARKET.

The receipts of grain to-day were 500 bushels. There were 400 bushels of wheat, which sold at 94c, and 100 bushels of barley at 54c per bushel. Oats quoted at 34c for new.

BRADSTREET'S TRADE REVIEW.

Montreal reports to Bradstreet's say city trade has been quieter during the past week and affairs have generally returned to a normal state after the rush and hurry of Congress week. Country trade keeps good. Wholesalers report an excellent volume of general business for this time of the year.

Winnipeg reports say the grain movement is now well under way and inspection of the quality of the wheat yield to be generally excellent. From those districts where the drought damage was most marked the wheat has been pretty much affected...

Toronto reports to Bradstreet's say a healthy tone is noted to all lines of trade there. All travellers are again out on their routes and they are sending in good orders for general lines of merchandise.

Vancouver and Victoria reports say there continues a good volume of business both at coast cities and at all provincial points.

Quebec reports Bradstreet's are pretty much the same as the preceding week. Hamilton reports say there has been rather a better tone to general trade here during the past week.

London reports say general conditions show little change from those of a week ago. Ottawa reports say general conditions are about as reported last week.

CHARGE OF THEFT

Employee of T. Eaton Company Charged With Stealing Gold.

Sent to Assayer's and Police Got Information Which Led to Arrest.

Toronto despatch: A short time after his arrest by Detective Armstrong yesterday afternoon on a charge of theft, John B. Gould, an employee in the manufacturing jewelry department of the T. Eaton Company, admitted that he was guilty of the charges against him. Gould at first placed the blame on a man by the name of Parker, with whom he lived at 47 Emerson avenue, but when confronted with the latter at police headquarters, changed his story. The specific charge against the man is that of stealing from the T. Eaton Company 395 pennyweights of gold valued at about \$400.

THE OPEN DOOR.

Right Hand of Fellowship to Burglars Instead of Kicks and Threats.

Chicago, Sept. 26.—Henry Neil, Secretary of the National Probation League, does not believe in lock and key to keep out burglars, and has had all such safeguards against the intruder removed from his residence. "If the right hand of fellowship were extended to burglars instead of the kick and threat, the world would be better, the penitentiaries would be emptied in a short time and there would be no need of lock and key, bolt and bar," said Mr. Neil.
