#### Level Crossing Accident

Wednesday afternoon about 2.30 Mrs. Frank Dusen and Mrs. Sharp of Waterford, were badly shaken up as a result of an upset of their buggy, caused by their horse being frightened by a passing engine at the All Line depot.

It appears that the two ladies had driven over to Simcoe to do some shopping and on their way home called at the Air Line depot, and just as they were turning out of the yard to proceed home an engine doing some shunting passed eastward in front of their horse. The animal took fright at the whistling and escaping steam of the engine and became unmanageable, and after bolting across the tracks, upset the buggy into the ditch on the east side, throwing the two ladies and Mrs. Dusen's little girl violently to the ground.

Mrs. Sharp received a nasty cut on her face and Mrs. Dusen fared even worse, being bruised about the head and all down her left side. The little girl, who is about three years old, escaped unhurt, although she was thrown a considerable distance.

The horse became entangled in the over-turned buggy and was thrown down, where it remained until released, but suffered no serious injury, although the buggy was almost a complete wreck.

Mrs. John Sherk, who lives quite near, with Mrs. Warren Culver, hurried to the assistance of the ladies and took them to her home, where she looked after them till evening, when they were able to proceed home with Mr. Dusen, who had driven over in response to a telephone call.

An unfortunate feature of the accident, besides the ladies being both hurt, is the fact that they each lost their pocketbooks. Mrs. Sharp had between \$15 and \$18 in her chateleine and Mrs. Dusen about \$18 and a gold watch, upon which she placed considerable value, in here. It is believed that some unscrupulous persons among the crowd, which soon gathered, possessed themselves of the valuables, as nearly everything else was easily found, even to the child's candy.—Reformer.

#### Saving Electricity

Tungsten lamps are coming to the front because they save electricity. In appearance, their only difference from the ordinary carbon filament incandescent lamp is that the filament is constructed of tungsten instead of carbon. But in actual use, it has been proved that they use only about one third as much current as a carbon lamp to produce a light of the same illuminating power. True, their first cost is greater (approximately three times as much), but this is counterbalanced by the saving in current effected. They have one weak point however. That is the case with which the delicate tungsten filament is broken. On this account great care has to be exercised in installing them, and it is for this reason, too, that they cannot be economically used as portable lamps. Yet when carefully handled, they have a long lease of life. In England where they are used much more extensively, than here, it is quite common for them to last 3,000 hours, and one instance is on record where a tungsten lamp burned continuously for over 15,000 hours. Ever when allowance is made for more frequent breakage, the tungsten lamp shows a saving over the carbon of about fifty per cent. That is an economy not to be despised and points to the much greater use for stationary lighting purposes.

#### Infantile Paralysis

In reference to the disease of infantile paralysis, which has become epidemic in certain sections of the country, physicians say that the best known prevention is to wash out the throat and nostrils, through which it is thought the disease is contracted, with an antiseptic several times a day. It is a disease which appears to spread quite rapidly in warm weather and there are comparatively few cases in cold weather. As it has made its appearance so late in the season, there appears to be no danger of an epidemic now.

#### Courtesy to Judges

We would like to say a word for the judges at the annual fairs. Their position is a trying one at best. Selected because of their expert knowledge and probity, they have to face a set of exhibitors each one of whom is banking on his animal getting the prize. The exhibitor is prejudiced in this direction before he enters the show ring. If it were not so, he would not be exhibiting. Every animal shown in a class cannot get the first place, and it is the judge's business to decide which should go to the top and which should follow in order of merit after the most fortunate one. While his judgment in making his selections may be open to criticism, he has a right to courtesy and fair treatment from each exhibitor. This sometimes is not accorded him, more's the pity. It is poor policy on the part of any exhibitor to raise a fuss when things do not come his way in the judging ring. It is the best plan to take one's medicine calmly and quietly, for no good can come of berating the judge for doing what, in his judgment, was the thing he ought to do. The best of judges may make mistakes, but if they are doing their duty to the best of their knowledge, no one, not even a defeated exhibitor, has the right to complain. If a judge shows that he is incompetent and does not know his business, the right thing to do is to enter a complaint to the fair management, and if it is grounded on fact, a remedy will be applied. But when a judge who knows his business is selected and he is doing his best he knows how, he is entitled, at least, to courtesy from every exhibitor.

#### Filtration of Water Supplies

The quality of water for human consumption depends on the polluting and purifying influences to which it has been subjected before reaching the consumer. It is well known that the general health of a community using a sewage polluted water gradually falls lower and lower and the death rate increases proportionately. Of the diseases most frequently following the use of an impure water, typhoid fever holds, at the present day, the most prominent position in the public eye. It is a serious fact, as yet unexplained, that the change from an impure water to a pure supply diminishes the sickness and death rate, not only from typhoid fever, but also from tuberculosis, pneumonia and other serious diseases. It is also a fact that in certain cities using a sewage polluted water the death rate from typhoid fever is many times more than that for cities using a filtered water supply taken from the same source.

Generally speaking, there are two methods in use for the filtration of public water supplies; they are known as the "Slow Sand" filtration and "Mechanical" filtration. In the former type, the water filters through beds of sand and gravel at varying rates of from two to five million gallons per acre every twenty-four hours, according to the character of the water. In mechanical filtration, a precipitate is first added to the water, which is then passed through a medium of sand under pressure, the rate of filtration being many times more than in the slow sand filters.

The type of filter best suited for any particular water must be carefully considered before adoption by a municipality and this can only be done by a competent sanitary engineer. When either system can be used, it resolves itself into a question of primary cost and annual maintenance. The slow sand filters cost, approximately, \$30,000 per million gallons of the daily consumption and about ten per cent. of this per annum for operating; while a mechanical filter costs about one-fourth, and, if carefully operated, a high degree of efficiency as regards purification can be obtained. This is well exemplified at Chatham, Ontario, where for some years filters of this latter class have been in operation, the water treated being that of that of the river Thames.

#### Time to Kill Poultry

Some authorities hold that fowl should be starved 24 hours before killing. This view is opposed by a writer in the American Agriculturalist, who says fowl should be fed up to the evening of the day before slaughtering and then killed in the early morning. It is said that the quality of the flesh is spoiled by the fretting which results from a longer period of starvation. There is a general consensus of feeling that fowl should be confined for a week or two before killing, as the prevention of undue exercise, and liberal feeding, tends to the putting on of a large amount of tender flesh.

#### Girl Murdered at Goderich

Goderich, Sept. 25th.—The mysterious disappearance of Lizzie Anderson, the 17-year-old daughter of Wesley Anderson of Saltford, was solved this morning by the finding of her dead body in a vacant house with her throat slashed from ear to ear. That a most dastardly murder has been committed is evident by the appearance of the body and the surroundings of the place where the crime occurred. Nearly every stitch of clothing had been torn from the body.
