

Resignation of Two Minis ters.

A special meeting of the Hamilton Presbytery was held in Hamilton last week to deal with the resignation of two ministers and a call extended by the congregation of Binbrook and Salt teet in the presbytery of Toronto. After 16 years service Rev. Charles H. Lowry resigned from the pastorate of St. Andrew's Church, Hagersville, giving as his reason for doing so that he considered a change would be beneficial to congregation and a concerned. The members of the congregation did uot want him to leave and a committee was appointed to ask him to reconsider the matter but he remained firm and the resignation was finally accepted, to take effect on October 23rd, and the necessary arrangements were made to declare the pulpit vacant. Rev. D. M. Buchanan was appointed interim moderator.

Buried in Gravel Pit.

A fatal and most deplorable accident took place at Fawcett's gravel pii, about two miles west of Hagersville, on Thursday morning, whereby one of Walpole's most highly respected and prosperous young farmers, in the person os George Ward, lost his life, and his hired man Alfred Smith was injured, although it is hoped not seriously. They were drawing sand and reached the gravel pit shortly after seven o'clock, starting to dig on the west side of the pit under an overhanging bank of earth. When about one-third of the load was on and the men were work ing directly underneath the bank it caved | in burying Mr. Ward completely beneath about 18 inches of earth. Mr. Smith partially escaped but was covered to the shoulders, being unable to extracate himself or to render any assistance to his employer. It was almost three-quarter,s of an hour before any person were cognizant of the accident. Mesers. James Fawcett and a young man named King went over to do some stripping and hearing moans rushed to tne rescue. James Awde, who was driving by, also rendered assistance but by the time Smith was released Mr. Ward was beyond earthly aid. It is supposed he died about the time Mr. Fawcett arrived as the latter claims to have heard him gash two or three times and then all was still. Dr. McDonald was soon upon the scene and after attending to Mr. Smith, ordered the body of the unfortunate victim conveyed to his home, deeming an inquest unnecessary. Mr. Ward leaves a widow and one child to mourn his untimeiy end.

The Hunting Season

Local hunters are asking each other what they will do about their hunting trips this fall, now that it is decided to extend the time for shipping dogs out of he infected rabies district from September 7th until December 7th. Muzzels will probably come off the animals on Septemher 7th, but according to a new edict it will be forbidden to take dogs out of the infected districts until three months later, or December 7th. This practically includes all the hunting season. Some hunters may abandon their trips if they cannot take their dogs along. The penalty for taking dogs from infected districts is \$200. The infected district is bounded on the east by the counties of Simcoe and York, so that every town in Western Ontario comes under the prohibition.
