Interesting Items Concerning Them Limp From Far and Near.

In addition to the frequent destructive fires in several towns and towniets, the number of which has just been augmented by a great conflagration at Radoschkovitzi, Jewish communal life in the Pale seems to suffer greatly from the extensive emigration movement in many districts. From some townlets on less than a third of the Jewish population has emigrated to America. During the last three or four months about 6,000 Jews of Podolia alone have left Russia, whilst the emigration from the provinces of Kieff (scene of the expulsions), Po!tave and Minsk is no less striking. The semi-official Rossia advises the Government to encourage Jewish emigration to Turkey, and seems to regret the difficulties which have arisen with the Galveston partiess

Mr. Abe. Bailey, speaking at Krugersrorp, said that the late Free State Ministers, who are now Gen. Botha's colleagues, had prepared a bill containing certain political disabilities for poorer Jewish immigrants, but that, under pressure, they withdrew it. The statement has created a profound sensation in South Africa.

An important announcement has just been made by the Turkish Minister of Public Works. The Minister has decided on the construction of several harbors, the preliminary measures have already been taken at a number of ports. including Jaffa, the port of Southern Palestine, and the landing place for passengers for Jerusalem, Hebron and South. ern Judea. It is probable, therefore, that at no distant period the difficulties attending embarkation and debarkation at Jaffa will be removed, greatly to the convenience of traveilers by sea and to the immeasurable benefit of the commerce of Palestine. The building of a modern harbor at Jaffa, combined with the building of a railway through to the Egyptian frontier to connect with the Anglo-Egyptian raliways, will open up the whole of the rich plains of Southern Phoenicia, and the El Arisch district. It is reported that large tracts of land in this portion of Palestine have been purchased by Jewish land development companies, and the proposed improvements will lead to the speedy settlement of this territory by Jawish colon sts

The annual report of the Ica Hewish colonization sociaty of Paris), the trustees for the Hirsch millions, reveal a very satisfactory state of affairs throughout all their co'onies. There has been a large increase in the Jewish population of both the Argentine colonies, and also those in Brazil and Cansda. The Palestinian colonies are in a most flourishing position. From one Palestinian colony alone, Petach Tikvah, there were shipped 139,976 cases of oranges, as against 52,233 cases the previous year.

The long expected circular of M. Schwartz on the status of the specifi cally Jewish schools has appeared. With one stroke of the pen the ministers have deprived these institutions of their privsleges, and in the future their certifieates will not be recognized anywhere. The Jews can only have a certain percentage of their children educated in the regular Russian schools, and now they are not even permitted to spend their own money on educating their own children, so as to be able to carn a decent living, even the Jewish cattle have a percentage law against them. The latest piece of regulation in this regard is the decision of the Mayor of Poltava to admit only "ten per cent." of the cattle owned by Jews to the municipal pasture grounds. This, too, after the fact that the cattle of both Jew and non-lew have fed on the same fields for years and neither hatred nor economic strife have demonstrated themselves among the four-legged animals.

A novel institution has just been established in Jerusalem in the shape of an institute for Hebrew music and chazanuth. The aims of the institute are to revive ancient Hebrew music, to train cantors to collect the songs and traditions of the Jewish race, to form a collection of Jewish musical instruments and a library of Jewish music, and poetry. The promoters appeal to lovers of Zion for assistance in their undertaking.

The Odessa Jews are still scarching for a suitable candidate for the coming Parliamentary by-election. The Cadets have opened negotiations with them with regard to the candidature of Dr. Tschausansky, or of Advocate Grosfeld. The former is, however, regarded as a doubtful friend of the Jews, and the latter has lost his popularity owing | gia. to his recent change of religion. It is possible that the Jews will recommend the banker, M. Weinstein, to the Cadet Committee. M. Weinstein is a good lew, and he is well known to the local voters. The negotiations are conducted in secret for fear of General Tchernatcheff's intervention.

A typical Russo-Jewish tragedy has just occurred at St. Petersburg. The local police station was recently enriched by a Jewish convert, who did some clerical work in the evenings and attended the university in the day. He changed his religion because he was unable to find any employment or to proceed with his course of study. His mother was kept by a daughter, who worked at night and attended a school in the day time. A short time ago he came across, amongst the documents he was revising, an entry to the effect that his sister had registered herself as a prostitute in the capital. The broken-hearted convert committed suicide. Meanwhile, his sister discovered her brother's whereabouts and hurried to him to explain that she only obtained the "vellow ileket" in order to procure the privilege of staying at St. Petersburg and of attending courses there. On henring of her brother's death, she, too, ended her life by throwing herself into the river.



#### BRITISH LABOR NOTES.

According to the London County Council register there are now no fewer than 594 employment agencies in the metropolitan area.

Nearly one-half of the applicants at Bradford Labor Exchange during the past fortnight have been single men under 20 years of age. A fund has been started to relieve the

distress caused by the stoppage of work at the India cotton mills, Stockport, where 1,300 hands are usually employed. The mill was closed seven weeks ago owing to bad trade.

Trouble has arisen between Sutton-in-Ashfield miners and the Notts Miners' Federation in respect to a week's wage which the men contend is due to them to enable the Colliery Company to complete repairh. The men have decided to

take proceedings to recover the money. The Elsecar main colliery dispute has resulted in 600 men deciding to cease work. A conference between the earl and the men's representatives took place on Wednesday, when it was decided that the notice of the new price list be suspended for 14 days, during which time wages be paid as heretofore. At the end of 14 days the price list to be adopted, and the management guarantee a day's wage of 7s. 6d. per day for three months. KING ALFONSO AND POLO.

Spanish Majesty Rated as a Four Man at Hurlingham.

King Alfonso is now an enthusiastic pelo player, and played for Rugby during his recent visit to the Duke and Duchess of Westminster at Eaton Hall. Country house polo has increased marvellously in popularity in England during the last ten years, and now several of the wealthy players have private grounds. The Duke of Westminster is one of them. Why a Cat Falls on Its Feet.

A scientist has constructed an ingeni ous model to show why a cat in falling invariably lights on its feet. This model. roughly speaking, consists of a cardboard cylinder wherein are stuck four rods to serve for legs, together with a tail devised on similar principles. The object of the experiment is to show that a feline's peculiar faculty depends on the rotation of its tail with sufficient vigor. This faculty is specially developed by elimbing and leaping animals, such as members of the cat tribe, monkeys, squirrels, rats and most lemurs. As already stated, the tail plays on important part in the turning process. According to the investigator all tree inhabiting monkeys have long tails, and there is not the slightest doubt that these tails are of great aid to all climbers in enabling them to turn in the air. Protecting the Lyre Bird.

So great has been the destruction wrought upon the beautiful lyre bird of Queensland (Henura superba), that the State has absolutely protected the bird till the middle of 1915; a £5 penalty is attached to its capture, or injury, or aking its eggs. Still the bird is getting scarcer and scarcer.

It is the extraordinary lyre form development of the tail feathers which tempts the sordid vandals. The contour of the bird, with its long neck and stout gallinacious feet, is by no means unlike that of a peacock, and the wonderful tail, possessed only by the male birds, fulfils a corresponding role of vain display. The bird executes antics for a train of female admirers on a raised earthen mound. For a short period of the year about January, the lyre bird loses its characteristic plumes and has to be content with the sober plumage of its mate. The fully developed male lyre bird is one of the most handsome and notable of the forms of bird life of Queensland.—From the London Globe.
