Struck by Motor

St. Catharines, Sept. 25.—Thinking she could cross the tracks of the Niagara, St. Catharines & Toronto Railway at Merritt Station before a freight train would reach her, Mrs. Ross, of Cypress River, Man., made the attempt but lost her life shortly after 7 o'clock last night. She had been visiting in Merritt and was on her way to the station when she saw the freight train.
