The Cattle Market

Many farmers are beginning to find out that they made a mistake last fall and during the winter in buying feeding cattle at high prices. The buying was done largely because feed was very plentiful. It is said that the recent decline in prices is going to last, and when the selling time comes all the farmer will be ahead of the game will be the increase in weight of the cattle if he is even that. The farmer who puts up cattle for finishing for market a few months, always takes a chance. He stands to make a good thing on his investment or lose money on the deal. So long as conditions governing the market when his finished cattle arrive are influenced only by the law of supply and demand, no one is to blame if the feeder is in a losing game. But the rumor is current indicating that the cattle market just now is not to be allowed to work itself out in a normal way. These may be only rumors, and have little foundation in fact. At the same time one cannot but feel a little sympathy for the farmer who paid out hard earned cash for high priced feeders last fall and spent time and good feed in fitting his animals for market, only to find rumors floating around that he is not to have clear sailing in getting the price which the normal condition of the market warrants him in expecting.

Dr. J. W. S. McCullough, provincial deputy registrar-general is warning the clerks of municipalities that they must send in returns of vital statistics. Many of these officials are neglecting to do so although it is compulsory under penalty of a fine. One clerk in Simcoe Co. has already been fined \$50, and other prosecutions will follow.
