Good Roads Report, The amended report of the Good Roads Committee was read and adopted as follows:

To the Warden and County Council. Gentlemen,—Your committee on Good Roads By-law beg leave to report that we have met in committee and considered the several sugges-tions as made by different members of the council regarding roads to be taken in the good roads system of Haldimand, and beg leave to submit the following by-law with amended sched-ule of roads attached:

SCHEDULE "A" Referred to in By-law No. ----hereto

Road No. 1. The Talbot Road, from the western coundary of the township of Walpole eastward, to the west limit of the village of Jarvis; thence eastward to Radical street in the village of Jarvis, and from Walpole street in the village of Jarvis eastward, to the East limit of the village of Jarvis; thence east ward to Balmoral; thence through the township of Rainham to Nelles Corners; thence through the township of North Cayuga to the west limit of the village of Cayuga; thence east ward to a point one hundred feet eas of the east end of the bridge across the Grand river, and from the west limit of Winnett street to the east limit of the village of Cayuga, and from the east limit of the village of Cayuga eastward to Teeft's store in the village

of Canboro. Road No. 2.

The Dunnville road from the south limit of the Talbot Road at the village of Canboro; thence south-easterly to the river road on the northerly bank of the Grand river; thence easterly along said river road to the west limit of the town of Dunnville; thence eastward on Main street in the town of Dunnville to a point about four chains east of Thompson's creek; thence northward to Lock street; thence eastward along Lock street to the eastern limit of the House of Refuge property.

Road No. 3.

The Forks road, from the easterly limit of the township of Moulton to the eastern limit of the town of Dunn-

The Rainham Road from the southerly limit of the lands of the Dominion Government at the village of Byng, westward to the town line between the townships of South Cayuga and Rainham.

Road No. 5.

The Town Line, between the townships of Rainham and Walpole from the Rainham Road at the village of Selkirk north to the Indian Line, being the line between the townships of Walpole and North Cayuga; thence northwest along the Indian Line to the eastern limit of the village of Ha-

Road No. 6.

The Indian Line, from the west limit of the village of Hagersville to the road allowance between the fourteenth and fifteenth concessions of the township of Walpole; thence west along

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the said road allo sance to the side

Road No. 7.

The River Road, on the easterly side Council met pursuant to the call of the Grand river from Indian street in the village of Cayuga alon; Munsee street to the north limit of the village of Cayuga; and from the north limit of the village of Cayuga to the Jastern limit of the village of Caledonia; and from the eastern limit of the village of Caledonia along Caitiness street

westward to Aberdeen street in the village of Caledonia; and from the west limit of the village of Caledonia westward along the north bank of the Grand river to the line between the Counties of Haldimand and Brant.

The Port Dover and Hamilton Plank Road, from where it enters the County of Haldimand at the west boundary of the township of Walpole to the Talbot road in the village of Jarvis, and from the northern limit of the village of Jarvis to Walpole street in the village of Hagersville: and from the northern limit of the village of Hagersville to the southern limit of the village of Caledonia: thence to a point in the village of Caledonia one hundred feet north of the north end of the bridge across the Grand River in the village of Caledonia; and from the northerly limit of the village of Caledonia to the allowance for road between the counties

Road No. 9. In the township of Oneida, from the side road at Cranston along the allowance for road between the fourth and fifth Concessions westward, to the Hamilton and Port Dover Plank Road.

In the township of Walpole, from the allowance for road between the fifth and sixth Concessions northward along the side road between Lots six and seven to the Talbot Road.

Road No. 11. In the township of Walpole, from the allowance for road between the fifth and sixth Concessions; thence for the allowance for road between Lots twelve and thirteen to the l'albot Road.

Road No. 12.

In the township of Walpole, from the allowance for road between the third and fourth Concessions northward along the side road between Lots eighteen and nineteen to the Indian Line between the Townships of Walpole and Oneida.

The Robinson Road, from the River Road on the north side of the Grand river; thence northward two miles. Road No. 14.

In the townships of Seneca, from the southeast corner of Lot number six in the fourth Concession southeast of the Stoney Creek road; thence along the allowance for road between the third and fourth Concessions westward to the river road on the easterly bank of the Grand river at thevillage of York.

Road No. 15.

In the township of South Cayuga, ville, and from the eastern limit of from the Rainham road northward ville, and from the eastern innit of trout the town of Dunnville along Broad along the allowance for road between street in the town of Dunnville to lower eighteen and nineteen to the allowance for road between the fourth

Road No. 16.

In the township of Dunn, from the Rainham road southward along the river road one mile.

Road No. 17.

In the township of Rainham, from the Rainham road northward along the side road between Lots number six and seven northward to the Indian Line; thence westward along the Indian Line to Nelles Corners. Road No. 18.

In the township of Walpole, from the Hamilton and Port Dover Plank Road westward along the allowance for road between the twelfth and thirteenth Concessions to the side road between Lots numbers twelve and

We visited the bridge over North Forks ditch on the county line North Forks ditch on the county line between Moulton and Wainfleet. We found it required a new bridge. We recommend that a new bridge be built.

Messrs. Young and Anderson visited the Black Creek bridge, Seneca and Glanford, and found a new bridge was required. We recommend that a new one be built.
