Cayuga, April 25. - James Y. Murdoen, the Jarvis lawyer who fleeced a number of his clients for sums aggregating some ten or twelve thousand dollars was this afternoon centenced by the county judge to serve a total of six years in the penitentiary. Asked if he had anything to say before sentence was passed, Murdoch said that he would suffer a great deal, as he would be deprived of his profession, and in the future would have to look to something else for a living for himself and family.
