### Farm Laborers' Excursion

50,000 Men Wanted for Harvesting in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta

This year's wheat crop, according to a conservative estimate, will be two hundred million bushels, and the Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta governments advise that fifty thousand men will be required. The majority of these will have to be recruited from Ontario, and the Canadian Pacific Railway are running excursions to Winnipeg and west at \$10. Free tickets will be supplied at Winnipeg to destinations in Western Canada east of Moose Jaw Saskatoon branches. Special through trains to Winnipeg will be run by the C. P. - Aug. 25, from all points East of Toronto in Ontario and Quebec.
