Moved by Holmes and Allen, that the Reeve be authorized to order a car of crushed stone from the Hagersville Contracting Company, Ltd.—Carried.
Moved by Messrs. Allen and Holmes that leave be granted to introduce By-Law No. 22—to strike rates to raise funds to defray the expenses of the village for the current year; which By Law was read a first, second and third time, and duly assessed as in the original motion. Which rates are as follows:—County rate 3 mills, Village rate 5 mills, General School rate 12 9-10 mills, Sidewalk Debenure 3 6-10 mills, Statute Labor 75c per day.
The County rate requisition is for 3 mills on \$85000 amounting to \$2550.00.
A deputation waited on the Council with a request to have the sidewalk on Monson Street repaired or rebuilt, which the Reeve promised to consider.

Moved by Messrs. Lewis and Burwash that this Council do now adjourn to meet again at the call of the Reeve.—Carried.

The Western Fair.

The management of the Western Fair are progressing nicely with the work of preparation for the ever-popular exhibition, which will open this year Sept. 8. The grounds will be lighted with hydro-electric light, and will be a regular fair-land. The machinery in the manufacturers' and implement building will be run by hydro power, and the exhibition of motors and dynamos will be well worth seeing. The butter-making contest will take place daily in the dairy building, where ample seating accommodation has been provided for the public to witness the competition and be comfortable. The demonstration of the care of bees will again be a feature this year, when the Government demonstrator, Mr. Pettit, will give practical illustrations of how to handle and care for bees. This is intensely interesting and should be seen by all. It will be located near the dairy building. The exhibit of "Old Curiosities" in the main building will again be a feature this year. The exhibit will be in charge of Mr. W. Smith, and any person having anything of interest should communicate with him at 1076 Dundas street, or the Secretary of the exhibition. Law as to Traction Engines

Sub-section 3 of section 10 of The Act to authorize and regulate the use of Traction Engines on Highways as enacted by section 43 of the Statute Law Amendment Act, 1903 is amended by adding to the end thereof the following words and proviso, "Of Less Than Eight Tons in Weight."
"Provided however that before Crossing any such bridge or culvert, it shall be the duty of the person or persons proposing to run any engine or machinery mentioned in any of the sub-sections of this section to lay down on such bridge or culvert planks of such sufficient width and thickness as may be necessary to fully protect the flooring or surface of such bridge or culvert from any injury that might otherwise result therefrom from the contact of the wheels of such engine or machinery; and in default thereof the person in charge and his employer, if any, shall be liable to the municipality for all damage resulting to the flooring or surface of such bridge or culvert as aforesaid."
