A cheap and reliable fly poison which is not dangerous to human life in household use. It is in solution. Dissolve one dram, which may be bought at any drug store, in two ounces of water, add a little sugar, and place about the house in shallow dishes. To clear rooms of flies use carbolic acid, heating a quart and pouring on it twenty drops of the poison. The vapor will kill the flies.
