Death of Mrs. W. Doughty

The keen sickle of death left its mark at the home of Wm. Doughty Con. 3, Walpole, when his beloved wife was cut down and carried to that haven from whence no weary traveller ever returns. About eight weeks ago Mrs. Doughty suffered from a gathering in her jaw, but did not pay much attention to it, thinking it might be just a gumboil. The gathering increased greatly in size, and it was thought advisable to consult a physician and it was then that the terrible truth was learned that she was the victim of a cancer. It was with difficulty that she could take any nourishment, thus her strength waned and on Monday, August 28th, 1911, the curtain was rung down on a useful life. Her maiden name was Agnes Arnot, and she was born on the 10th of November of 1840. She had reached the age of 72 years, 3 months, 10 days. She was a friend tried and true and as a neighbor none could be better. About 25 years ago deceased was married to her now bereft husband, who with seven sons and one daughter are left to mourn the loss of an ideal wife and a loving and devoted mother. The funeral took place on Wednesday, service being held in the Methodist church, Nanticoke, after which the remains were laid to rest in the Nanticoke cemetery. The deep sympathy of the community is extended to the grief-stricken family and friends.

Died at Klauane, Alaska.

The sad news came to Nanticoke last week of the death of Joseph Lamb, son of Charles Lamb, Sr., which took place on July 29th, at Klauane, Alaska. Mr. Lamb was raised in Nanticoke but later took up his residence at Klauane. His death was due to an accident. It seems he and two others were crossing Lake Klauane in a Peterborough canoe, when coming to rough water the canoe capsized, throwing the occupants into the water. One of the men could not swim so after placing him on the canoe he and his friend started to swim for shore, but after going a short distance he sank in the ice cold water and rose only once. A desperate attempt was made to rescue him but all efforts were fruitless. It is supposed he was taken with cramps. What makes it still more sad is that his brother Robert, of Montana, was on his way to Klauane to visit him. They intended to go on a big hunt for a month or so and both returned to Nanticoke this fall. Mr. Lamb's body was found two hours after the accident and was buried the following evening. Much praise is due him for his heroic effort to save his companion, both friends being saved. Mr. Lamb was 43 yrs. of age and leaves to mourn his loss an aged father, five brothers, namely, Samuel, Alfred, Charles, Walter and Robert, also three sisters, Mrs. James Hedges, Mrs. J. Hoover and Miss Ida.

Opening of the Schools

No lover of his race or country can contemplate the regular opening of the schools next month without a feeling of profound solicitude for the welfare and training of the children and young people. A fact which has never been fully understood and appreciated, in connection with educational work, is that home life should take on a new order and spirit, relative to and in connection with the opening of schools. Every child and young person should be made to feel this new order and spirit, in the home, just as effectively and resolutely as in the schoolroom. The whole family life should accommodate itself to school life. Meals should be planned in conformity with the necessary hours of school work. The clothing of children and young people should be thoughtfully put into neat and substantial order, thus impressing the young minds with a practical, parental solicitude, which will go far towards inspiring them with a realization of the great dignity and importance of the work of the school room. These should be such that school and home life should be harmonized around the table and the fire. Children and youths should be made to understand that the school is not a place to be attended habitually in the way of a social duty. Attendance is to be regular. Tardiness is not to be tolerated. Lessons are to be promptly and thoroughly studied and mastered. The highest standards of discipline and deportment are to be enforced and maintained, and a spirit of kindness and courtesy is to be inculcated, on the play grounds and in all recreative and social intercourse and association. It must never be forgotten—the home life is the other side of the school life. In the sympathetic and practical unity of obligation and effort on the part of the home and the school only can the best results be obtained—otherwise our educational work will lag and limp and fall infinitely short of the best results. Let the Superintendents, Principals and teachers of our schools also remember that they are not only to inspire and conduct the school life according to the highest methods and ideals possible, but that more than all other influences combined they can, and should be required to bring about this sympathetic bond of co-operative planning and working between the school and the home.
