What Is The Cost?

The answer to this question is that the cost of a Canadian Government Annuity depends upon four things: 1st, the age of the applicant; 2nd, the amount of Annuity required; 3rd, the age at which the Annuity is to commence; and 4th, the plan on which the purchase is made. Tables which answer these questions have been published by the Department and may be had on application. Annuities are payable for life, but for a small additional payment may be guaranteed for a number of years certain, not exceeding twenty, so that should death occur before the guaranteed period expires the annuity would be continued for the remainder of the twenty years, to the Annuitant's legal representatives. By the latter plan the return of a specific sum is assured. Any other details of this important Annuity plan may be had on application to the Superintendent of Canadian Government Annuities, Ottawa. Comparison of Yellow Pine and Douglas Fir

Wood using industries in Canada reported to the Forestry Branch for 1910 the use of \$642,000 worth of yellow pine and \$69,500 worth of Douglas Fir.

From scientific investigation and experiment it has been ascertained that our native Douglas fir could in many instances replace pine, as at present used in Canada. Yellow Pine is necessarily all imported from the United States, and if a species of native wood could be introduced to take the place of yellow pine, the change would be of great benefit in the development of Canadian Industry. Douglas Fir is a lighter wood than yellow pine and has a greater limit of elasticity, that is, it stands more bending without making a permanent set. Likewise compression perpendicular to grain is resisted equally by both species. In the western states the use of this wood is being rapidly extended and the recently discovered qualities are introducing it for purposes in which previously only yellow pine was thought fitted. Douglas Fir is a light and strong wood easily work-

ed. For railway cars and vehicles it is used throughout the United States where its elasticity and durability recommend it for nearly all purposes except where a hardwood has to be used. Because of the beauty of its grain and the attractive effects which may be obtained by staining, it is very popular for inside panel work, door and window frames and cheap classes of furniture, particularly "mission" furniture. Furniture, car and vehicle manufacturers will benefit if Douglas fir was used to a greater extent in Canadian manufacture.

A Hint To Autoists.

"A lady residing in the country dropped into our office a few days ago and asked us to request the owners of automobiles to dispense with the small banners which many of them bearing the name of their home town. She says her horse and many others are more scared of the banners than of the auto. Her horse, she said, was just as near a dead one as it was possible for a horse to be and travel at all, and she was making no kick at the autos, but if the banners could be dispensed with, she thought it would be better."—Delhi Reporter

After The Potato Bug

The recent press item regarding the discovery in Middlesex County of a prodigious beetle feeding upon the potato bugs, has aroused much comment and considerable satisfaction to potato growers. Different parts of Southern Ontario also report the presence of this insect in greater or less numbers. It is prevalent in Norfolk County. The insect, is not a beetle, however, not having the hard wing covers of the beetle family. This apparently new beetle belongs to the class known as "true bug" and is a very close relative of the stink bug or berry bug, the odor and taste of which most of us are familiar. In shape it resembles the berry bug but is slightly smaller with pale yellow markings on the margin of the wings and back. Another species has red markings. The yellow marked variety is a voracious feeder and is a particular enemy of the potato beetle, which it destroys in great numbers. Many will perhaps be surprised to learn that these bugs have been known for over 40 years, being recorded in the Entomological Report in 1871 as acting in the same satisfactory manner. While it is interesting and remarkable that they should be so widely distributed and prevalent this year, it is unfortunate that these insects are rarely found sufficiently numerous to keep the potato beetles in control.

Where the Shoe Pinches

The Delhi Reporter hits the nail on the head when it says: "Sometimes mail order houses offers a leader, that is, they sell some article at less than cost, in order to induce buyers to make up an order which will include many things at a great deal more than cost. The big firm comes out ahead on the whole transaction all right—that is what they are there for."

We heard of an experience of a certain lady the other day who thought it would be a good scheme to simply order the leader, the article that sold at less than cost. The particular bargain offered was a pair of shoes at \$1.00, when the shoes arrived there was a charge of 25c. for express which she paid. After she got the shoes home, she discovered that they did not fit, so she packed them up again and returned them by express. The firm said she could return the goods if not satisfactory, at least that was in the advertisement. She paid another 25c. to return them. After waiting about a week the new shoes arrived, and she had to pay another quarter for express, unfortunately, they were no better than the first ones as far as fit was concerned. She had now paid \$2.24 for a pair of \$2 shoes, with more to follow. She tried to exchange them with a local dealer, but, of course, that would not work; but while in the local store she saw as good a pair, in every respect, which the dealer sold for \$1.65 regularly. She may find a lady friend to fit the shoes. If so she may not lose more than \$1. If not she is out \$2.44.

When a woman thinks she has obtained a bargain, she tells her friends about it; but when the experience is not favorable she is apt to say nothing about it.

Most people would rather say nothing when they have got the worst of a deal, although they think they have got the best of it. That is human nature, but that is why we do not hear more about the experiences of those who deal with mail order houses.

When you come to think of it, is it not rather foolish to buy things just from seeing a picture of them? A farmer would not buy a cow from a catalogue, because he knows something about cows. How much more important is it to see what you buy and know with whom you are dealing when you are getting something about the quality of which you are not able to judge. The Delhi merchant wants your trade and he knows that the best way to get it is to be perfectly candid about the quality of the goods he sells. He knows more about the quality of the goods he sells. He knows more about the quality than you will ever learn unless you go in business for yourself. If an article is not the best he will tell you so, and charge you fairly for what you get. We cannot afford to buy the highest quality of goods, but we are at least entitled to get fair value for the money we spend and to know just what we are getting. The only way we know of to accomplish this is to buy at home from a merchant in whom you have confidence. In the long run you are money in the pocket by doing so and in addition you are helping your own town not injuring it.

Great Britain is now lending money to Canada to the amount of about \$400,000,000 a year, says the Colonial Office Journal. Last year the visible capital raised in England for Australasia was about \$1,000,000. The comparatively recent investments in South Africa amount to about \$35,000,000, nearly equal to the whole amount, which has been supplied to Canada and Australia from the beginning.

Is there really any difference between the man who takes pay for his vote, and the man who votes on the side of his own financial interests? Some people argue that there is no and they have some show of reason on their side. The national, patriotic and moral elements are supposed to be considered at every election and to have the preponderating influence in determining the casting of the vote. If a man should count these things as nothing and the advantages that may accrue to himself everything, he cannot claim to be a high type of citizen, but may have some of the elements of a man in him. But the man who sells the sign and surety of his citizenship for a mere hand out is nobody.
