Beets will cook in a very short time if they are covered with cold water and allowed to stand twenty-four hours before being placed over the fire. A piquant flavor for beets is made by boiling together sugar and vinegar in proportion of one cupful of sugar to each quart of vinegar; boil with this a spice bag containing a tablespoonful of ginger, cinnamon and cloves. When the liquid is boiling vigorously, pour it over the beets.

Jarvis, Nov. 14th, 1911.

The Village Council met at call of Chairman, the members all being present.

Minutes of last meeting read and on motion were adopted as read.

The Collector of Poll Tax paid over to the Treasurer \$13.90

Lewis—Allen—That the Chairman and other members of the Council be a committee to scrutinize the names of the Local Option petitioners, and compare the names with the last revised voters' list and bring in a report.—Carried.

Lewis—Allen—That C. E. Bourne be authorized and instructed to go to Cayuga on Wednesday, 15th inst., to take legal advice as to certain disputed names on Local Option petition.—Carried.

Holmes—Allen—That this council do now adjourn until Wednesday evening 15th inst.

November 15th, 1911.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment, all members present.

The committee appointed to investigate the Local Option petition reports as follows:—

We, your committee, appointed to investigate and report upon the petition of the ratepayers of Jarvis, asking for the submission of a By-law for Local Option beg leave to report as follows:—

1. We find that the petition was filed with the clerk on the first day of November 1911, as per entry, made by him at the time of receiving it.

2. That there are 43 names subscribed to the petition, all of which appear to be eligible voters on parts 1&2 of the Jarvis voters' list for 1911.

3. That there are 191 names who appear to be eligible voters on said lists or parts of lists.

4. That the necessary number required for presentation with the petition is 48 or one fourth the eligible voters, we cannot therefore recommend that the prayer of the petitioners be complied with.
