#### Hagersville.

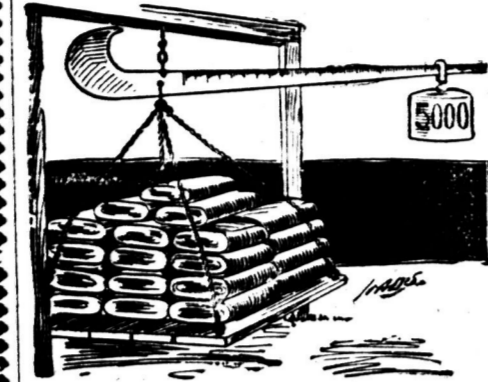

#### Sudden Death

Many will regret to hear of the sudden death of John Wesley Burns M.D., of Caledonia. Thursday morning he did not feel well and remained in bed. About noon Mrs. Burns went to arouse him, but was horrified to find him cold in death. It was not known at what hour he passed away as he seemed to be sleeping during the morning. He has not enjoyed good health for many years, and it is thought his system was weakened from the result of a serious operation which he underwent about two years ago, but however, his death came with awful suddenness. Dr. Burns was a graduate of the Toronto Medical College and throughout his course not only took the gold medal but gave promise of being one of the cleverest practitioners in the province. About 36 years ago he opened up a practice at Caledonia and from that time until his death he resided in the village. In 1878 he was married to Miss Louisa Clarke, daughter of the late Rev. Mr. Clarke, of Niagara-on-the-Lake. Some years ago Dr. Burns took an active interest in municipal matters, at one time being warden of the county. He was also for years a member and chairman of the School Board. Deceased who was in his 56th year, was a member of the Oddfellows' Lodge and also the Independent Order of Foresters, the latter having charge of the funeral, which took place Saturday. The deceased is survived by his wife, four daughters—Miss E. Burns, Niagara Falls; Mrs. Ross, Edmonton; Miss E. G. Burns, Calgary, and Miss Helen at home; and one son, Dr. H. S. Burns of Hamilton, also his father, Rev. W. Burns of Toronto, and two sisters and one brother.

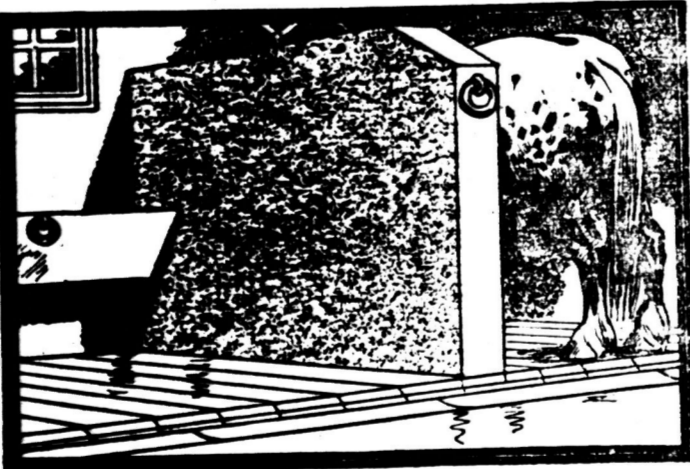
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
