Like Strawberries and Cream--Many Crosses Before Success Came.

Plant Wizard of Galifornia Evolves a New Strawberry.

Santa Ant, Cal., Jan. 2. Luther Burbank announces the creation of a strawberry of a new type, the "Patagonia." The plant wizard says the betry is the result of years of effort. It ripens first. and continues to bear the longest. The eaves are large and unusually thick and firm, with a thin, silky down, and ware never injured by sunburn, where other varieties are either seriously browned or wholly destroyed."

The berries are uniformly large, single berries sometimes weighing an ounce, and of a fine scarles color, with handsome pair fiesh. The seeds are so small as to be almost imperceptible. The new strawberry meits in the mouth, with a sweet pineapple, strawberry and creamlike flavor. Burbant sayr:

"Some twenty-five years ago the work of improving the strawberry was commenced on my grounds. The best combination in this work resulted in the erosses with the seeds of the wild strawberry, sent by Mr. Burbank's collectors in Chili, obtained from the lofty Cordileras Mountains and in the coast region of southern South America, and also with Brandywine, Longworth's Proliffe Monarch, Marshall, and some of our native California berriess but no striking or very unexpected results were observe ed until the second generation, when among the very namerous hybrid seed lings under test was found this unique berry, which was at once recognized as the grand prize which has at last been produced after much expense, labor and care during the past twenty-five years"

BLOWN UP.

Tacoma Man Has a Scheme on a Gigantic Scale.

Make Toronto and Hamilton the Hub of the Continent.

Mr. Gillies Will Seek the Federal Government's Aid.

Toronto despatch -A P. Gillies, of Tacoma, Washington, who appeared before the board of control here with an army of New York financiers last summer and presented a scheme for the building of a subway terminal in Toronto, is here again with another scheme which he proposes to work in conjunction with his subway terminal idea and one, according to Mr. Gillies, will, if operated successfully, make Torouto the hub of the continent, double Hamilton's population, and make Ontario one of the greatest manufacturing provinces in the world. In looking for a source of power to operate the proposed subway terminal, the idea of digging a canal from Goderich to Hamilton, which would effeet a fall of 200 feet between the two lakes, occurred to Mr. Gillies, and he claims he has now the backing of sufficient capital to see the scheme com-

Early in January he will present his project to the Federal and Provincial Governmente, asking their co-operation in the undertaking, which he believes is truly a national one, and also to ask them to guarantee bonds for construction of the canal.

The proposed canal will be 35 feet deep and 300 feet wide and by deepening the canals on the St. Lawrence River, ocean liners will be able to sail from Chicago and Fort William direct to Liverpool, making a saving of 1,700 miles of marine transportation. benefit of the New England States have been reaping in consequence of the prosperity of the west will now be diverted to the Provinces of Eastern Can-

Even though the Government refuse to give assistance, the Canadian National Canal Co., he says, are determined to carry out the scheme on their own responsibility. They will offer the government the option of a part ownership and complete control of the project, and on this account Mr. Gillies thinks the government will realize the feasibility of the enterprise and its possibilities as a revenue maker and adopt it as a as a revenue maker and adopt it as a plank in their reform platform during the next campaign. Folls on the tonnage passing through the canal, with the earnings of the power generated therefrom will in 20 years pay for the cost of it.

Merger Plan For United Empire Bank Shareholders.

Dividend Will be Over 5 Per Cent. Which is Better Than Now.

"France and America salute thee, Eng- Union Bank Will Secure Good Business Connection by Move.

> Terente despatch: The shareholders of the United Empire Bank, whose absorption by the Union Bank of Canada has bee nannounced, will be given Union Bank shares in return for their United Empire stock at the rate of approximately two for three. Union Bank stock is now selling around 150 and shares of the United Empuire Bank, although not listed on the Stock Exchange, have been selling close to par. Holders were asking 102 yesterday on the strength of the proposed amalgamation. The stock has risen about \$15 during the last two weeks.

The basis of agreement which heen arranged by the directors of the tw., institutions will have to be ratified by the shareholders of the United Empire Bank when they meet in Toronto six weeks hence. That they will readily approve of the amalgamation is almost certain since the eight per cent. dividend paid on Union Bank stock will realize five and a third per cent, for them on their invested capital, a rate which exceeds their return from United Empire stock by about one per cent.

Speaking yesterlay, Mr. George P Reid, manager of the United Empire Bank, said that the bargain would be a good one for the shareholders of United Empire, while the Union Bank would secure good business connection through the amalgamation in a number of desirable sections of the Province. Regarding his reason for consenting to the amalgamation, Mr. Reid said:

"We found it very hard to put out stock. The several bank failures of the last few years have made the investing public less confident in purchase of bank stock, and we have not been able to secure adequate capi-

An increase of the capital stock of he Union Bank was authorized at the last annual meeting from four million to eight million. Yesterday Mr. John B. Waddell, Toronto Manager of the Uaion Bank, said that the greater portion of the increase would not be put out at once, but that about half a million of it would be used in the taking over of the United Empire Bank. The Union Bank is one of the oldest banking institutions in the Dominion, and has 202 branches in Canada, thirty-six of which were opened last year. Montreal, Jan. 2.-Mind your own business and we'll mind ours, is the reply practically given by the transportation interests to the Quebec Legislature with regard to the Levergne dual language bill, which is supposed to go into effect on Januar /

The bill provides that in the Province of Quebec all railroads and other transportation companies shall have their tickets, way bills, telegraph blanks and other documents printed in both French and English.

The railroads are objecting to this very strongly, on the ground that they use French where business interests show that it should be used, but they object to having to use it otherwise in order to advance the interests of politicians. As a result it has been decided by the Canadian Pacific, Grand Trunk, Canadian Northern and other transportation interests that they will simply "stand pat" on the thing.

Although the measure goes into effect on January I, no change will be made by the transportation people in their business literature. It will then be up to the Provincial Government to enforce the

If this is done the railroad and other companies will defend the case, and it is stated that if necessary they will carry the thing to the privy council rather than submit to the dictation of the Nationalist feeling of the Provincial Legislature as to introducing two languages where only one is required.
