

Gentleman-In compliance with rules and regulations expressed in the Bylaw passed for the government of House of Refuge, I beg leave to present the following report, but before any reference is made regarding the inmates of the institution I feel it my duty to state that the matron, Mrs. G P. Brown and assistant, deserve my highest praise and commends tion for the care, attention and kind treatment bestowed on the inmates as exhibited at all times during my visits. Speaking from observation and from remarks made to me by those who have been received into the refuge, I conscien tiously declare that this eulogium is no misplaced nor underserved. Remarks made by visitors in the register provided will bear me out in this assertion. I have at all times found everything clean, neat and in good order, and the inmates speaking in terms of praise of their matron 14 persons have been admitted since the opening of the Home of whom 9 have at various times received my professional care, visits for several successive days having been made in some cases. From opening day to Nov. 1st, 28 visits (professional) were made by me.

Margaret Cooper, age 74-health fair, considering her age; complains of cardiac weakness at times; have given her tonics several times as well as other medicines to make her feel she is not being neglected; her present state of health is. I believe satisfactory.
