County Council
Dec. 19, 1910

Council met pursuant to adjournment. All members present, except Mr. Robertson. Minutes of last meeting were read, Shaver—Roulston—That the minutes be adopted vs read.—Carried.

The following communications were read: Heticion of Carleton County re third class teachers.

Shaver—Roulston—That the following members of the Council be a committee on communications: Messrs. Smith, Anderson, McQuillin and Smelser.—Carried.

Smelser—Parsons—That we do now adjourn to allow the different committees to meet.—Carried.

Shaver—Roulston—That the report on Communications be received and read.—Carried.

To the Members of the County Council of Haldimand.

The Committee on Communications beg leave to report as follows: We recommend the petition of Carleton County and that the Warden and Clerk sign the said petition and forward (in re School Act.)—R. W. Smith, Chairman.

Smelser—Bain—That the report on the Special Committee on Communications be adopted as read.—Carried.

Smelser—McQuillin—That the report of the Special Committee on Sewerage be received and read.—Carried.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council of Haldimand.

Gentleman—Your Committee appointed to deal with the sewer to the County House of Refuge at Dunnville beg leave to report as follows: We met the Council of Dunnville, and after some discussion, the Council of Dunnville proposed that the House of Refuge should be connected with the town sewer at Centre street by way of Broad Street; that the sewer should be built at the expense of the County, by the town of Dunnville under the supervision of the consulting engineer; that the cost of keeping up the sewer on Broad Street should be paid by the County of Haldimand but done by the town of Dunnville. That as soon as the sewer was used the town of Dunnville should contribute toward its maintenance and as soon as the whole sewer should be used on the street the County should be at no cost of maintenance; that the sewer on the street should be the property of the town of Dunnville and that the County should not be chargeable with anything for the maintenance of the sewer of Dunnville or its pumping plant. Your Committee was of the opinion the offer of the town of Dunnville was very favorable to the County and accepted their proposition. The contract has been let in accordance with the above at a cost of \$756.08 to Messrs. Hamilton & Waddell. Respectfully submitted.—J. J. Parsons, Chairman.

McQuillin—Bain—That the report of the Special Committee on County House of Refuge sewerage system in connection with the Dunnville Council be adopted as read.—Carried.

Pyle—Secord—That we now adjourn to meet at 1:30.—Carried.

Roulston—Shaver—That we do now adjourn to allow the different committees to meet.—Carried.

Pyle—Secord—That the report of the Supply Committee be received and read. Carried.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council of Haldimand.

Gentleman—Your Committee have purchased a pair of bob-sleighs from F. McDowell & Son, of Dunnville, for \$32 and a cutting box from Chas. D. Trimble, Dunnville for \$11 for use at the House of Refuge farm, and recommend payment of same. Also a load of straw from C. Walton for use at jail for \$5 and recommend payment of same.

We recommend the purchase of a writing desk from Brett & Masson of Dunnville for use in the office of House of Refuge for \$25, also a grind stone for home form. We recommend that linoleum be purchased for the vault of the Surrogate Court.—Respectfully submitted.—W. D. Roulston, Chairman.

Clive—Watson—That the report of the Supply Committee be adopted as read.—Carried.

Shaver—Roulston—That the report of

the Home Committee be now read.—Carried.

To the Warden and Councilors of the County of Haldimand.

Gentlemen—We, the Home Committee, beg leave to report as follows:—Have purchased two cows from A. Jarvis for \$85 delivered at House of Refuge; we have examined the Manager's accounts as shown by Committee and find them correct, amount due \$495; recommend payment of above account. Inmates 18.—Henry Pyle, Chairman, R. D. Secord.

Smelser—Clive—That the report of the Home Committee be adopted as read.—Carried.

To the Warden and Councilors of the County of Haldimand.

Gentleman—In compliance with the rules and regulations expressed in the By-law passed for the government of House of Refuge, I beg leave to present the following report, but before any reference is made regarding the inmates of the institution I feel it my duty to state that the matron, Mrs. G. P. Brown and assistant, deserve my highest praise and commendation for the care, attention and kind treatment bestowed on the inmates as exhibited at all times during my visits. Speaking from observation and from remarks made to me by those who have been received into the refuge, I conscientiously declare that this eulogium is not misplaced nor undeserved. Remarks made by visitors in the register provided will bear me out in this assertion. I have at all times found everything clean, neat and in good order, and the inmates speaking in terms of praise of their matron. 14 persons have been admitted since the opening of the Home of whom 9 have at various times received my professional care, visits for several successive days having been made in some cases. From opening day to Nov. 1st, 28 visits (professional) were made by me.

Margaret Cooper, age 74—health fair, considering her age; complains of cardiac weakness at times; have given her tonics several times as well as other medicines to make her feel she is not being neglected; her present state of health is, I believe satisfactory.

William L. Hancock, age 76—When admitted was suffering from neuritis, clothes constantly wet in consequence; in a bad state of health generally; a mental and physical wreck. Under treatment his condition was considerably improved. Difficulty was experienced in inducing him to take the medicine left and he refused at times to do so. As a result of his obstinacy he became worse again; vitality gradually and constantly declining. There has been a general atrophy or wasting prior to his admission to the House. Called several times to see him and other patients. Death occurred on

Elizabeth Kearns, aged 94—Nov. 1, totally blind, health otherwise good; have not been called on to prescribe for her.

Geo. B. Buchanan, age 70—Has suffered from vertigo for a long time and at the time of admission complained of constant pain in the back of his neck, in the region of vertebra prominens. Since coming to the Home he has been quite ill and confined to bed for a considerable time, with complicated diseases; ordered a diet of milk and gave remedies with satisfactory result. There is marked improvement in his condition. Nov. 1 He is walking about the Home again.

Stephen Lambert, aged 55—Had a stroke some time ago, leaving him with impaired vision. He has a very weak heart, unable to work when admitted; gave him general tonics with special heart tonics. He is willing and has been able to do considerable light work on the farm, e.g., gathering beans, cutting and setting up corn. His condition requires him to move slowly. He has had several severe attacks of threatened heart failure. Profuse perspiration worse during the night has been of great annoyance and distress to him. Treatment for this and threatened heart failure has been given him. He has expressed gratitude for kindness and attention received and is greatly pleased with his home. His sudden death will cause no surprise. Nov. 1, condition as good as can be expected.

Angelina A. Lambert, age 51—Weak minded; heart action not very strong. She is hysterical and at that time in life (climacterics period) when changes may be expected; declined to do much work and probably does not feel able; when admitted she was suffering from sore eyes the treatment for which was satisfactory; called by phone to attend her when I diagnosed and treated her for hysteria, leaving at the same time heart tonics; was called next day, the matron being greatly alarmed on her account. On seeing and examining her, my former diagnosis proved correct. I believe she has since had no fits. At two different times she was treated with rheumatism from which she was a real sufferer. Nov. 1, present state of health, fair.

Susanna Moore, aged 39—Weak minded, nervous, bad teeth, gave nerve sedative with the result of marked improvement in her condition; removed 4 teeth. Nov. 1, in fair state of health.

Alice Lambert, aged 17—Mentally weak physically not well developed, apparently healthy. She is willing to do all that is asked of her. A good dishwasher and will probably become a good ironer of clothes, as she is improving in her ability to do work, to which she was previously unaccustomed. Nov. 1 have not treated her for any ailment.

Roland Cunningham, age 76—Nov. 1, apparently well, has received no treatment.
