Between Toronto and Detroit

The H. S. Falls Company to Build This Coming Summer New Premises That Will Put Them in the Front Rank of Ontario Stores

(From the Norfolk Reformer)

The Reformer is in a position to announce that the H. S. Falls Company has definitely decided upon the erection of a large store building. As is well known the Company secured, at the time the Lynnwood grounds were broken up into lots, the choice site on the north-east corner of Norfolk and Argyle streets immediately across the street from the Company's present store. This lot has a frontage on Norfolk street of 80 and runs back 105 feet on Argyle street to a lane, which separates it from the site purchased for the Carnegie Library.

A commission was placed in the hands of a leading firm of Toronto architects some time ago, and the plans and specifications for the proposed building are well advanced, it being the intention of the Falls Co. to have the work of construction begin as soon as the weather will permit, so that the new premises will be ready for occupation in time for the next holiday trade.

The Reformer has been favored with an inspection of the tentative plans and can assure its readers that the new building will be an important addition to our town and should prove a valuable factor in the attracting of trade from the more distant parts of the county of Simcoe.

The building is to face on Norfolk street and will occupy the entire 30 feet of the frontage on that street. It will be 10 ft. in depth and consist of a basement and three other flats. It will be equipped with passenger and freight elevators, cash and convenience, in fact every modern convenience for effective merchandising. Room will be provided for the addition of several lines not now handled by the Falls Co., which will make the "Departmental Store" even more of a reality than in the past. Two features that are receiving special attention from the architects are lighting and ventilation. There will be windows everywhere, ensuring to customers the best possible lighting on the gloomiest of days; an up-to-date system of mechanical ventilation will be installed guaranteeing pure air all over the building constantly.

We congratulate the Falls Co. most heartily and wish them every good fortune with this enterprise. The Company has for years enjoyed a large measure of prosperity, but it has long been apparent that its trade was often done against a handicap of insufficient room. In their premises there will be room and equipment for anything that may come. As readers of The Reformer are aware the Simcoe store is one of a syndicate of like establishments in St. Thomas, Chatham, Orillia, Ingersoll, Tillsonburg and Ridge town. This syndicate has a purchasing capacity that makes it an equal competitor with the largest organizations in the Province. Now so far as concerned it will soon have a place of selling that in size and completeness will not be surpassed in all Ontario between Toronto and the Detroit River.
