### Bank of Hamilton Proprietary.

"Year's statement shows increase in total assets and a generally healthy condition."

The shareholders of the Bank of Hamilton have reason to feel pleased over the evidences of prosperity contained in the Annual Statement presented to them at the Thirtieth Annual Meeting of the Bank, which was held on the 16th of January.

From \$39,000,000, a year ago, the Bank's total assets have increased to \$41,514,369.21.

On the 30th of November, 1909, the balance at credit of Profit and Loss account was \$403,665.34. This has been augmented by the past year's profits and by premium received on new stock, to a total of \$1,006,325.34. Out of this latter sum, \$500,000 has been carried to Rebate of Interest account; and \$25,000 written off Bank premises; the dividends, amounting to 10 per cent., disposed of another \$258,514.53—thus leaving \$192,810.81 to be carried to the credit of Profit and Loss account.

Deposits show an increase over the previous year. In 1909 they were \$80,981,454.63. In 1910 they increased to \$82,310,001.03.

The Reserve Fund has been augmented from \$2,500,000 to \$3,000,000; while the capital stock is \$2,680,570.

The increasing of the Reserve is an indication of sound, conservative policy; while further evidence of good management is to be found in the large proportion of liquid assets shown by this Statement.

These latter include \$636,263.15 in Gold and Silver Coin, and \$3,399,611.00 in Dominion Government Notes; notes of and cheques on cheques on other Banks covering another million-and-a-half dollars; \$3,725,337.26 is held in Canadian Municipal Securities, and \$725,079.79 in Bonds, Debentures and Stocks.

Altogether the Report shows a highly satisfactory condition and further proof of that careful direction of the Bank of Hamilton's affairs that has brought this institution to the position it occupies among leading Canadian banks.
