The annual meeting of the Walpole Farmers' Mutual Fire Insurance Co., was held on Saturday last and was fairly well attended. The annual report as presented by the Treasurer was quite satisfactory, showing a substantial increase in assets over 1909. The three retiring directors, namely: Robert Miller, James Martin and W. J. Biggar were all re-elected. The meeting was strongly in favor of the Company purchasing a building for head office and by a vote of the meeting the Jacques' property was decided on. At a subsequent meeting of the Board of Directors, Robert Miller was returned as President and James B. Wilson as Vice President.


Obituary
The many friends of Mrs. Charles Perrett will learn with deep sorrow and regret of her sudden death, the sad event occurring on Saturday morning, Jan. 14th, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Wm. Crowley of Walpole. Mrs. Perrett, along with her husband went to visit their daughter on New Year's Day intending to remain a short time. At that time she was enjoying the best of health but on Friday she complained of not feeling well. Medical aid was at once procured but despite this and the kind ministrations of loving hands she gradually sank and on Saturday her spirit wended its way above, the immediate cause of her death being pneumonia. Deceased, whose maiden name was Mary Vokes, was born in the township of Toronto in the year 1850, she thus being in her 61st year.
