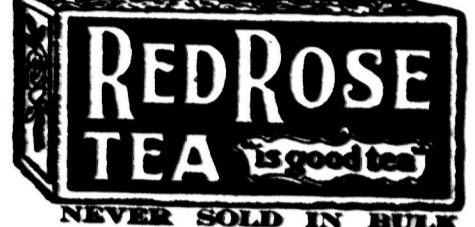

There is not a great deal of new industries starting up, but one of our leading industries are enlarging, that is our pickle factory, they are now building an addition 40 x 60 feet to the factory and will, after the erection of the new addition, bottle pickles as well as putting them up in bulk. Johnston pickles now are quite well known throughout the county, and we predict for them a large business in the near future.

**How Census Will Figure Out.**  
The authorities at Ottawa have figured out pretty accurately how the census is going to affect the seating capacity of the ensuing Parliament at Ottawa. From what information can be obtained, Ontario is to lose five seats, and one of these is to be the seat held by W. F. McLean, whose riding will be split up between Toronto and the other two Yorks. There will be but one Huron and probably only two Middlesexes. The Maritime provinces are to lose three of their present seats, and British Columbia is to be practically what it is now. The big addition will be made in the North-western provinces, where there are to be 25 new seats. The basis of representation will be one member to every 33,000, instead of 25,000 on the last census.
