TO ESCAPE WORK

Extent to Which Malingering Has Been Practiced by Prisoners.

A certain Englishman-Dr. R. F. Quinton by name—who has served 32 years in various prisons in his native and as medical officer and governor, has many interesting experiments to relate. According to Dr. Quinton when he entered prison service at the Portsmouth convict prison in 1876. malingering was practiced to an ex-tent that is hardly credible by desperate men who would go to almost any length in order to escape work.

"Self-inflicted injuries of the most erious character often led to amputation of limbs and other operations. The practice of placing arms and legs under railway trucks on the works was so prevalent at one convict prison that no less than 25 major amputations were performed in one year.

"Another violent prisoner who feigned stiffness of his index finger to avoid oakum picking was so irate when the finger was forcibly bent that on returning to his cell he promptly placed the offending finger in the hingse of his table, which was attached to the cell wall, and violently raised the leaf, with the result that the finger was absolutely shattered and had to be removed.

"A remarkable example of the per sistence with which a malingering career could be carried on was afforded y the case of the notorious criminal servitude for life in connection with the Bank of England forgeries. He was in good health on conviction, but never did any active work in prison.

Coffee.

The old coffee houses which were so common once upon a time have disappeared, but the popularity of the everage still remains. Only two plants of the species are cultivated to any in its third year and then bears only a small crop of fruit. The fifth year is usually the time of its first considerable yield. In Java three gatherings are made yearly, called the "early," the "chief" and the "after crop," but only the second is of great importance. The flower enjoys only a short-lived existence, as the setting of the fruit usually takes place within 24 hours and the petals wither and fall off almost immediately. A coffee estate in full bloom is a pretty sight, but its

glory is very quickly past.

The name Mocha is applied generally to the coffee produced in Arabia and Abyssinia. The best portion of its crop goes to Turkey and Egypt, being bought on the trees by traders, who themselves look after the picking and preparation. Abyssinia is the original home of coffee. The finest coffee of Arabia is grown in the Yemen province and the best beans are reerved for consumption in the country or the courts of the Sultan of Turkey the Khedive of Egypt or the Shah of Persia, or the other principal rulers of the Mahometan world. In the British Empire the chief coffee producing countries are India, Jamaica, British Central Africa and Ceylon. Small quantities of the product are also grown in Queensland, British Honduras and Natal.
