



SUBSOIL OF PARIS

Some time ago a well was driven in the Place de l'Hotel de Ville, in Paris, for the purpose of ascertaining the nature of the subsoil of the French capital. The revelations threw light on the manner in which great cities, in the course of centuries, bury the relies of

their past. First comes a layer of rubbish, nearly four and a half feet thick, dating from the sixteenth century to the nineteenth. A second layer, a little over two and a half feet thick, consists of rubbish recognizable by the character of its fragments as belonging to the period from th fourteenth to the sixteenth century. This is searated from the first layer by a thin deposit of sand, and a second sandy deposit covers the third

At the bottom is a clayey deposit filled with fragments of pottery lie and Gallo-Roman periods.

Sometimes obstinate hiccough is reieved when the patient is strong by having his hang with the arms extended and grasping some beam or pole, so that his feet do not touch the floor. With all the abdominal muscles tense, have him hold his breath as long as possible.

Sneezing is very efficient in certain since it is the exact opposite to hiecough, being a sudden expiratory act. In Plato's "Symposium" the physician Eryximachus recommended too much, to hold his breath or to gargle with a little water, and if not relieved to tickle his nose and sneeze, whereupon the hiccough would be sure to go.

The spelling "hiccough" is recent, being a combination of the syllables "hic" and the latter term of "cough," which without either physiological or etypological basis; the pronounciation, with perhaps the rarest exceptions, is still that of the older form "hiccup," earlier given variously as "hickup," "hickups-nickup." "hiekhop," "hickcock," "hich-cock," and "hickett," with quasi diminishing suffixes ock, et; but the "hick" a syllable aptly expressive of the spas-modic sound produced by the conditions giving rise to the particular disturbance is found in all references to the oribeen able to obtain. The term singultus is rarely used.
