Simcoe Reformer.—The County Council of Haldimand at its recent session, by a ye and nay vote of 13 to 3, finally passed a by-law bringing into operation a county road system and taking over 18 roads completely covering the county. The roads will be built to conform the government requirements, and it is estimated that the cost will run from \$150,000 to \$200,000, of which the Provincial Government will contribute one-third. Stuck down between the good road systems of Elgin, Oxford and Haldimand, Norfolk promises soon to be an object of desire for all visitors.

Never before in the history of St. Ann's church was their annual garden party such a success as the one held at Mr. John Feeny's last evening. Death of Levi R. Shoup.

The unexpected death of Mr. Levi R. Shoup which occurred on Monday, July 10, at his home in Walpole occasioned general regret and sorrow. He suffered a paralytic stroke some months ago but gradually recovered from the effects and was able to be out again. On Sunday morning, however, he suffered another attack and steadily grew weaker until he passed away.

Deceased had resided upon the old homestead in Walpole all his life with the exception of a few years in Hagersville when he operated the sash and door factory there. He was a man who made and retained friends and was held in high esteem by all who knew him.

While a member of the Municipal Council of Walpole he served the township faithfully, his judgement being frequently relied upon. He was a member of the Methodist church and lived a consistent life. A wife, one daughter and a son survive. The children are Mrs. (Dr.) Shaver, of Chicago, and William, at home.

The funeral took place on Wednesday, July 12, and was largely attended. Services at the Springvale Methodist church and at the grave were conducted by Rev. Caldwell.

The local A. O. U. W. Society, of which deceased was a member, attended in a body and the beautiful and impressive burial ceremony of the Order was carried out at the grave. Interment was made in the Springvale cemetery.

All Equal Chance

One of the features of the Canadian Government Annuities system which highly commends itself to every person is that a man who is middle aged enjoys equal advantages with the man who starts at a younger age, for he may by the lump sum equivalent to the total amounts which he would have paid had he entered on the earlier age go on from his present age at the same rate as if he had begun at an earlier age. A school teacher who has just cashed in a twenty year endowment policy has made the application of this amount on a \$500 Annuity Contract, a most prudent disposition of a portion of his money. If he dies before he is 60, the total amount which he pays up to the time of his death with 37 compound interest will be returned to his legal representatives.
