ROYAL LEGACIES TO HONORABLE

Royal Persons Frequently Relieve Legacies From Strangers.

Legacies bequeathed by subjects of whose existence they have known nothing, have frequently been the portion of European rulers. Many of these bequests were received by the late King Edward Among living rulers, the Kaiser and the Emperor of Russia must be set down as the principal legatees of admirers.

Not long ago William had left him by a Munich testator the sum of \$35,000, "as a humble subject's mark of appreciation of the splendid monarchical and statesmanlike qualities which his majesty has displayed, and to signify dissent from the criticisms that are from time to time levelled against him." The majority of the many legacies left the Emperor came just after the efforts which he made a few years ago in support of The Hague Peace Convention.

Edward VII. was the possessor of a portrait that served as a constant reminder of the most curious will ever made in honor of a royal family. The picture was that of Henry W. Gibbs, Q.C., C.B., who, for a period of six years, in the 50's, was the private tutor of Edward, then Prince of Wales. In the will Mr. Gibbs also left to Queen Victoria a packet of letters "in the red box that contained my patent as Queen's counsel." To the present King, George V. (then Duke of York), and to the then Duchess of Fife, he left the sum of 100 guineas each. In the case of the latter, however, the will was revoked on the occasion of her marriage to Prince Charles of Denmark, but a codicil made her the recipient of 100 guineas, so that it should not appear that she was forgotten.

An odd feature of legacies left to royalty is that they sometimes come from enemies toward their own kindred, because they are friendless, make their sovereign their heir. Such was the case of "Daddy East," as he was well known to Londoners who frequented the Bloomsburg region. It is said that he was the most successful beggar that ever prowled that quarter. He lived in a dirty cellar, and increased in rage, a circumstance that led no one to suspect that he was the possessor of quite a fortune.

The police, however, had their suspicion, for when he tried, a search was made of his cellar, with the result that over 500 pounds in gold was found hidden under the floor. There was also unearthed a will, carefully drawn up by a lawyer and properly attested. It consisted of but two lines, requesting that the money that was found should be handed over to her Majesty Queen Victoria for her own use.

Allan Day.

If you should ever be in Cornwall, in old England, and should rise some morning before the sun peeps over the low eastern hills, and should see a fair maiden, clad only in her night-dress, sedately seated beneath a tree and solemnly eating a large apple, be not startled, but merely admire; for it is Allan Day.

Allan Day is the nearest Saturday to Halloween, and is a great children's festival in Pembrokeshire and St. Ives in Cornwall. Everywhere are exposed for sale huge apples known as "Allan apples," and the eating of them brings good luck. Girls and boys put them under their pillows at night and dream of their future husbands and wives.

To make the dream come true, one must rise at dawn, and, in perfect silence and clad only in a night-dress, stand at the foot of a tree, and eat the apple on which one has dreamed, whereupon the future consort will make his or her appearance—a consummation that to folks outside of Cornwall would appear slightly embarrassing. Moreover, if one does not become cold, he will remain immune from chill throughout the year.

Antarctic History.

Shackleton's discoveries, as interpreted by geologists, throw some interesting light on the past and the present of the Antarctic continent. It has long been surmised that certain south polar lands at one time may have formed a connection between the chief continental regions of the earth, Wilkes Land, South Victoria Land and Graham Land, with other regions more recently named, have been conceived as forming a continent which in remote periods may have stretched its shores to connections with the other continents of the southern hemisphere. These suppositions have been placed beyond doubt by Shackleton. Parts of the Antarctic continent have been submerged, but it was originally a continuous land surface of vast extent. Africa was connected with it, and through it with South America and Australia.
