Returns Per Cow

Out of 2,400 cows tested last month in Ontario for members of cow testing associations, 805 of them, or over one third of the total number recorded, gave yields of over 1000 pounds of milk and 35 pounds of butter fat. Many cows gave over 40 pounds of fat. With butter fat valued only at 20 cents per pound, this means that good cows are earning \$2.00 per month more than poor cows. If this average is multiplied by a period of ten months, it follows that there is actually a difference in the income from two such cows of as much as \$20.00 in the season.

These astonishing differences are only brought to light and to the apprehension of owners when they begin to record weights of milk and take samples for testing. If cows are viewed from a right perspective (a full season's satisfactory production and not a brief, near-sighted glimpse of a record for a day or a week) not one will be retained in the herd that does not return a good profit; and such common differences as noted above will not be possible in the properly selected dairy herd, each cow now selected on the basis of her individual demonstration of profit made. Every dairy farmer will find it advantageous to keep dairy records.

Absent Thirty Years.

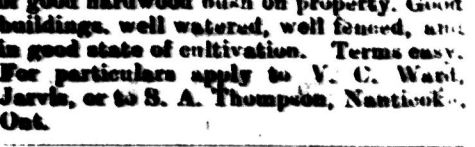
