Death of Roy McNeaney

The deep sympathy of the entire
village of Jarvis is extended to Mr.
and Mrs. John McNeaney, of Hamil-
ton in the sorrow which befall them
last week in the removal by death
of their eldest son, Roy Vance, the
sad event occurring at their home
on Thursday, June 1st. On May 21st
the young man was stricken with
that much dreaded disease,
pleuro-pneumonia, but it was not
thought that his case was serious
and those in attendance upon him
held good hopes for his recovery,
but those hopes were rudely shat-
tered, for on the above day at 1.30
he was called away to pay nature's
debt. Deceased, who was only 17
