

## U. S. Legislation Worries

(From our own Correspondent) Montreal, May 31.-Officials of the arge trrnsportation interests in Montreal are questioning one another as to the neaning of certain clauses which appear in bills presented to the United States House of Representatives recently. They fear that they- are aimed against them and are worded with a view to seeing to it that Canadian transportation interests do not benefit as a result of any increased traffic between Canada the United States. Bill 4660 which was introduced in the House of Representatives by Mr. Rucker Excellent facilities for all kinds of Job Colorado, contains the following claute:

> "Every vessel not of the United States that shall arrive direct from her own country, its colony or possession, in bailast or with merchandise produced here or with passengers in a less proportion than one-third of her burden of capacity for freight or passengers as aforesa shall pay a duty on the gross meas ments in addition to the regular duty imposed by law as follows: On all vessels not exceeding 2000 tons, 10 cents per ton; not exceeding 2400 tons, 25 cents per ton; between 4000 and 8000 tons, 50 cents a ton; between 8000 and 12,000 tons. 75 cents a ton; between 12,000 and 16,000 tons, \$1 a ton; between 16,000 and 20,000 tons, \$1.25 a ton: exceeding 20,000 tons, \$1.25 a ton.
