## To Sharpen A Lawn Mower

Take the driving wheels off, remove the  
ratchet and change them, placing the left  
ratchet on the right and the right ratchet  
on the left side of the machine. This will  
cause the revolving blades to strike back-  
ward on the cutting bar. Put some heavy  
machine oil in the groove on the cutting  
bar and place some emery dust in the oil.  
Turn the mower upside down and push it  
around, keeping the cutting bar in close  
contact with the revolving blades. As  
soon as the blades are sharp, wipe off the  
oil and emery carefully and change the  
ratchets. This will sharpen the blades  
more evenly than can be done with a file.
