## Death of Mrs. Hartwell

By the relentless hand of death  
Jarvis loses one of its most valued  
and highly esteemed citizens, in the  
person of Mrs. Frances Hartwell,  
who passed away on Monday, June  
19th, 1911. Deceased, whose maid-  
en name was Nora E. McDowell,  
was born in Wolfe Island, near  
Kingston, on May 3, 1845, and on  
Nov. 30, 1870 she was united in mar-  
riage to her now bereaved husband.  
They at once took up their resi-  
dence here and remained ever since.  
Some eight years ago she became  
afflicted with that dreaded disease,  
rheumatism, and at times suffered  
excruciating pain and about three  
years ago she became an invalid.  
Mrs. Hartwell remained in much  
the same state of health until Sun-  
day morning about 5 o'clock, when  
she took a stroke, and from that  
time she gradually sank until death  
put an end to her sufferings. Al-  
though her affliction was hard to  
endure a complaining or dissatisfied  
manner, as to her lot, never escaped  
her lips, but rather she was always  
pleasant and felt and expressed that  
her will was in subjection to that of  
her Saviour. She was truly a Chris-  
tian woman and the fragrance of her  
pure sweet life will linger on and on  
for many years. She was a faithful  
member and worker of St. Paul's  
church and at the time of her death  
held the position of Sec'y-Treasurer  
of the Women's Auxiliary. It will  
be in this circle that her departure  
will be keenly felt. She leaves to  
mourn her death her husband and  
one daughter, (Edith) Mrs. Grise,  
of Penetanguishene, besides a host  
of friends, who feel to-day that an  
ideal and true wife and mother and  
a much cherished neighbor and  
friend has been taken from them.  
We commend the sorrowing ones to  
Him who doeth all things well. The  
funeral took place on Wednesday at  
10:30 a.m., service being held at St.  
Paul's church, the remains then being  
laid to rest in Knox church cem-  
tery. Many and beautiful were the  
floral tributes which were placed on  
the casket, emblems of love and  
fidelity to the departed soul.

## Funeral of the late Wesley Widdis

Mr. and Mrs. Wm. P. Parkes, of  
Buffalo, N. Y., and Mr. and Mrs. C.  
W. Vahey of Bridgeburg, Ont., con-  
stituted a sad group as they alighted  
from the 10 o'clock train from the  
east on Thursday morning, 15th  
inst. They were bringing for in-  
terment in the Methodist cemetery  
the body of Wesley Widdis, son of  
Mrs. Parkes and nephew of Mrs.  
Vahey. The deceased, who was 34  
years of age, had died in a hospital  
in Cleveland, Ohio, a victim of pul-  
monary tuberculosis. In the car-  
riages of the funeral procession were  
also a number of sympathizing rela-  
tives and friends of the Jarvis com-  
munity. The following acting as  
pull bearers: Messrs. William Park-  
inson, Wm. Bizar, D. Steele, R.  
A. Walter, J. and Wm. Shuter. The  
funeral services were conducted by  
Rev. Arthur C. Eddy, B.D., pastor  
of the Methodist church. Richard  
Widdis, father of the deceased, was  
killed by lightning, some five miles  
east of Jarvis, about thirty years  
ago. The Record joins with many

the bereaved.

## HALE AND HEARTY

At Eighty-Five Years of Age.

On Sunday, June 18th, Mr. W.  
C. Parsons celebrated the 85th an-  
niversary of his birth and at this  
ripe old age he is enjoying excellent  
health. Mr. Parsons has seen many  
changes in his sixty odd years a re-  
sident of this part of Canada. He is  
one of the few old men left who  
may justly be called the pioneers of  
Walpole. When he first came into  
this vicinity Jarvis had only a cou-  
ple of buildings. The chief occupa-  
tion of man was lumbering, and he  
followed that work for a few years  
before engaging in farming. On  
May 11th, 1850, he married Mary A.  
Henning, and they have enjoyed  
over sixty years of married life.  
Few people would think to look at  
Mrs. Parsons now that in her girl-  
hood days she was considered an  
excellent horsewoman. In those  
days about the only way to go a  
journey was on horseback. Mr. and  
Mrs. Parsons are the parents of J. J.  
Parsons, the present Reeve of Wal-  
pole, whose wife's parents, Mr. and  
Mrs. James Hovey of Woodhouse,  
have also reached a ripe old age,  
having been married over sixty  
years. The combined age of these  
four old people is 340 years. Reeve  
Parsons and his wife are quite proud  
of the fact that their parents of each  
have celebrated the diamond jubi-  
lee of their wedding.
