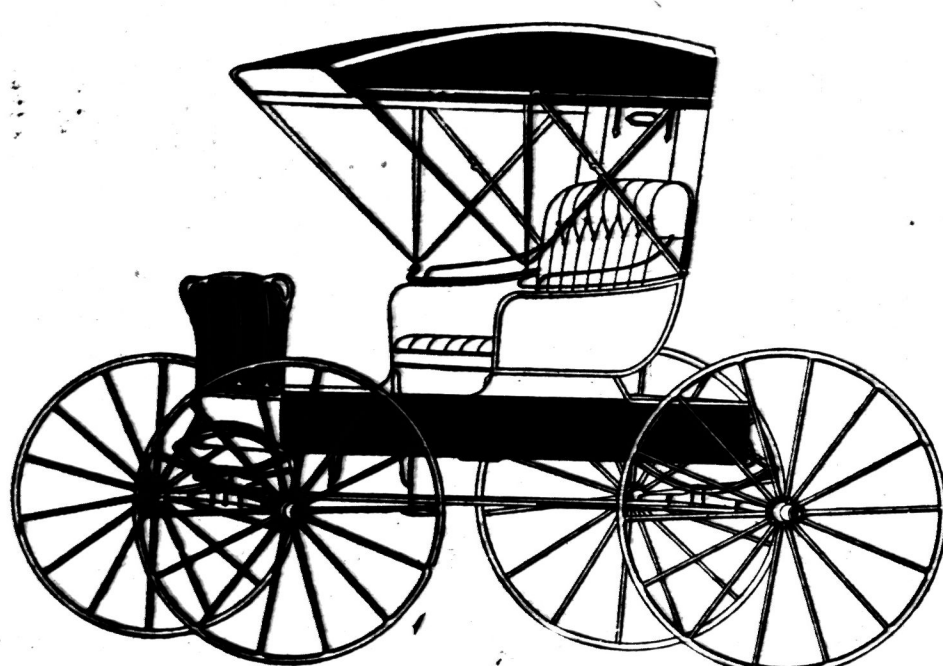

#### County Council

Cayuga, June 8, 1911

Council met pursuant to adjournment. All members present.

Smith—Watson—That this Council resume business.—Carried.

The minutes of former meeting were read and adopted.—Carried.

The following communications were read: From Department of Education; Ontario Provincial Winter Fair; Ontario Good Roads Association; 37th Regiment; The Dominion Natural Gas Company.

Cline—Anderson—That Messrs. Walton, Brooks, Sinclair and Young be a Special Committee on Communications.—Carried.

Cline—Anderson—That Council adjourn to allow the different committees to meet.—Carried.

Buckner—Almas—That we resume business with Warden in chair.—Carried.

Brooks—Smelser—That report of Road and Bridge Committee be received and read.—Carried.

To the County Council of the County of Haldimand.

Gentleman—Your Committee beg leave to report that all the work approved of by you to be done by this committee has been arranged for. We recommend that the approaches to the Scheyler bridge between Norfolk and Haldimand be repaired by tile draining and surfacing with stone. We recommend that the old bridge, west of Spring Creek, be replaced by a two-foot tile. We estimate that the sum of \$1,500 will be required to meet current expenses of the Committee. We ask permission to meet again and report.

To the Warden and Members of County Council.

We, Your Home Committee, have met at the Home, we found 17 inmates, (10 men and 7 women.) On going through the House we found everything in good condition; also the outbuildings. We found the farm and all surroundings very good condition. We also found your nursery stock had been delivered in good condition and planted out and all living, adding much to the general appearance of the Home. We would recommend the following:—that the manager purchase 350 tile for under drainage, and, as the gravel is all on the ground, we would recommend that the manager be instructed to build a cement walk from the entrance of the building to the roadway, a distance of 300 feet to be 6 feet wide, about 1,900 feet. Also from each entrance in the rear of the building to the barn about 400 feet long 2 1/2 feet in width, about 100 feet, or a total of 2,800 square feet, and that he employ a practical man to assist in the work. We also recommend that the report of the engineer be carried out re drainage on the south east corner of the farm, a distance of 800 feet. We recommend that a hot plate be placed in the laundry, also 24 feet of pipe, 3 stop cocks, 3 nipples, 3 keys and 50 feet of 3-ply hose for watering the lawn and cleaning the windows, pump and sink, and all necessary fittings from cistern to laundry at a cost of \$13.50. We estimate a cost of \$2,500 for current expenses of the house and farm.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Anderson—Smith—That, whereas it appears that the auditors' report and financial statement of certain years are fast becoming antiquated, we would recommend that the Clerk be authorized to have the same bound in cloth that they may be preserved with other records of the county.—Carried.

Brooks—Walton—That this Council resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole to take up the question of equalization and other matters, with Mr. Bain in the chair.—Carried.

Smelser—Parsons—That we resume business with Warden in chair.—Carried.

Roulston—Young—That the report of the Committee of the Whole re equalization of assessment for year 1911 be received and read.—Carried.

To the Warden.

Your Committee of the Whole on equalization beg to report as follows: Parsons—Smith—That the assessment of the County for 1911 be the assessment for 1911, with the following changes:—Moulton \$27 per acre; Dunnville \$700; Oneida \$36; Jarvis \$85; South Cayuga \$40.
