Warm Weather Zone is Moving Northeast

The danger of summer frosts in a few years' distance is threatening the South—especially in the West—due to the fact that the warm weather zone is moving northeast.

(From our own Correspondent)
Montreal, June 24.—That summer frosts, the bane of the farmer and orchardist, would soon become a thing of the past if the trend of the Dominion continues to disappear as rapidly as they have of late, and that Canada in not many years from now will be as renowned for her semi-tropical products as she is to-day for her timber, are two rather startling and interesting announcements made by climatological experts who had been comparing notes on the weather during the annual convention of the American Climatological Association held here.

This does not mean that the juicy "fameuse" apple, known to all as being just about the most succulent edible the province of Quebec produces, will be supplanted by Jamaican yams, nor that Montreal melons will be superseded in their glory by Florida oranges, but it does mean that there is a change coming over Canada's climate. One of the reasons given is that the thinning out of our forests makes the air less stagnant, that the snow melts more rapidly and that the thermometer rises earlier than in the old days when piles of snow might have been seen woods while the field were bare and dry. On the other hand, it was pointed out that deforestation tends to drought, as the snow all melts quickly causing a flood with no reserve of moisture.

The fact that there is a climatic reciprocity between Canada and the United States, by virtue of which the latter export their heat waves to us, Canada providing them with cold feet in winter in return, was also alluded to despite the fact that the organization is non-political and there was nobody present to urge legislation for or against the exchange.

Dr. A. D. Blackader of Montreal was elected Pres. of the association, the first Canadian to receive such an honor. The organization is composed mostly of Government weather prophets and seismographers stationed in all parts of the continent, the gentleman from whom the newspapers receive the forecasts of the day's doings amongst the stars.

HISTORY BEING PHASE
The phase "Let George do it" is likely to be succeeded in this city at least by the phase "Let Mary do it," since as a result of the approaching coronation Mary has proven herself much more capable of the two at a rate of about five thousand to one. Movements have been underway both abroad and in this country to secure contributions from all women named Mary to purchase a gift for the Queen and from all men named George to buy something for the King. As a result Queen Mary has been presented with a cheque for \$22,500, as a result of the industrious efforts of her legion of namesakes. Part of this will be used by her in the purchase of gowns and part will be devoted to charity. But to the shame of the local Georges must be told the fact that contributions from them in this city so far amount to only \$13 coming from 10 contributors. Just why the Georges have made such a poor showing is a mystery, some authorities holding that in view of the present equal suffrage movement it is up to Mary to do things. The fund of \$13 will however be duly forwarded though there is considerable doubt as to what sort of a coronation present will be purchased with it. One of the local Georges has suggested a special \$13 coronation cigar as the most appropriate gift. The thousands of Georges who did not contribute however will be happy if the incident results in retiring the current slang phrase associated with their name.
