An Interesting Report

Published elsewhere in this issue is the Annual Report for the past year of the Board of Directors of the Canada Cement Company, as read by the President to the Shareholders, at the Annual Meeting held in Montreal on the 21st of February.

Obituary

Saturday evening, March 4th, 1911, on the threshold of the Sabbath, Margaret Fallis, widow of the late John Ivey passed peacefully away in her eighty-second year, at her residence, 100 St. George Street, Toronto, Ontario, Ireland, was the scene of her childhood days. There too she became a member of the Methodist church and continued steadfast to the last in her attachment and devotion. On Nov. 25th, 1855, she was happily wedded and on Nov. 21st, 1905, the marriage tie was broken by the death of her devoted husband. Her quiet, consecrated life has been a benediction to her home and the Jarvis community. For a number of years she was severely without pain and a number of times previous to her last serious illness her life was despaired of. Through the kindly ministrations and pain she manifested the kindly spirit which characterized her whole life. The funeral took place on Tuesday, March 7th. A short service was held at the beautiful home, to which the family had removed some months ago. This was followed by a largely attended service in the Methodist church, conducted by the pastor, Rev. Arthur Clare Eddy, B.D. The deceased was born in the town of Vancouver, grandson, and Abram and William Fallis, nephews. Two sisters and two brothers, constituted the family to which Mrs. Ivey belonged, the sister being Elizabeth (Mrs. William Jennings) mother of Mrs. Andrew Rodgers of our village, and the brothers Robert and John, the latter being the father of Rev. F. W. Fallis, pastor of Woodgreen Methodist church, Toronto. The deceased survived by three sons, Richard F. and John at home and Albert of Collingwood; also three daughters, Francis and Elizabeth at home and Margaret (Mrs. Charles Nichol) of Walpole.

Arnold and Marshall Roberts, Charles Stallwood and J. Hunwick and a mixed quartette, consisting of Messrs. Wm. MacNeil, Ainslie Jackson and Misses Mable Parkinson and Ruth Glanfield. A chorus was rendered by the Junior Mission Band choir, a duet by Miss Anne Saunders and Miss Mabel Parkinson, a solo by Miss Shirley Rodgers and a duet by Misses Maud and Mabel Parkinson.
