The County Council.

Cayuga, March 9, 1911.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment. All members of the Council were present. The minutes of the former meeting were read and adopted.

The following communications were read:—Miss L. M. Patterson, requesting to be appointed Court reporter; Major Williamson, for grant to be used on County grounds; George & Gertrude Brown, for increase in salaries; Salvation Army, request for grant; Ontario Good Roads Association, request for grant.

Young—Buckner—That Messrs. Anderson, Eain, Smith, Smelser, Almas, and the mover and seconder be a committee to open the tenders for the County Printing.—Carried.

Young—Buckner—That we do now adjourn to allow the different committees to meet.—Carried.

Anderson—Almas—That this Council resume business with the Warden in the chair.—Carried.

The report of the Home Committee was read and adopted as follows:

Report of Home Committee.

To the Warden and County Council:

We submit the following: We met at the Home on the 7th of March and examined the books and accounts and compared them with the vouchers and found them correct as certified to by the Manager. We found seventeen inmates in the Home, eleven males and six females. We also found there had been two deaths in the Home, one male and one female. George Buchanan died February 17th, and was buried by his son; Mrs. Elizabeth Kearns died January 29th, also buried by her son. We also found two commitments: Daniel Wismer, Dunnville, January 28th—Pay patient; Patrick McLaughlin, February 7th. We also inquired from the inmates whether they had any complaints to make against the manager or matron and found them unanimous in their expressions of praise in regard to them both.

We also made an inspection of all the different apartments and found them all together with their contents very neat and clean. We also found the stables and all the outbuildings together with the stock in first-class condition. We recommend that the Supply Committee have a schedule printed or typewritten and hang up in the kitchen of the Home of all the prices of the different supplies furnished by them for the convenience of the manager. We also recommend that the Manager and Matron be paid an additional one hundred dollars, namely \$600.00 per annum.
