The evening addresses were "Evangelism in the Sunday School," and "Conserving the Boy," the former subject being taken by Rev. Mr. Kelly and the latter by Rev. Mr. Farewell. Both speakers were listened to with interest and profit. Resolutions relating to Sunday school work, brought before the Institute by a committee appointed for this purpose, were unanimously endorsed.
