A meeting of the Officers and Directors of the Public Library was held in the Library Room, on Saturday evening, April 30th. J. C. Sanderson in the chair and a full attendance of Directors.

The first order of business was the reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting, adopted as read. A discussion then took place as to the disposal of the fund, donated to the use of the Library by the Women's Institute, and on Mrs. Simpson explaining that the money was to be used for the purchase of new books, it was so ordered.

On behalf of the Committee on the collection of the fund for paying off the debt on the Library, Richard Walters reported that they had been very successful, and that the full amount of the money needed had been secured and that a cheque for \$85 would be handed over to the Treasurer, and on motion of C.
