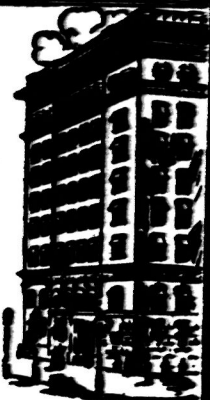

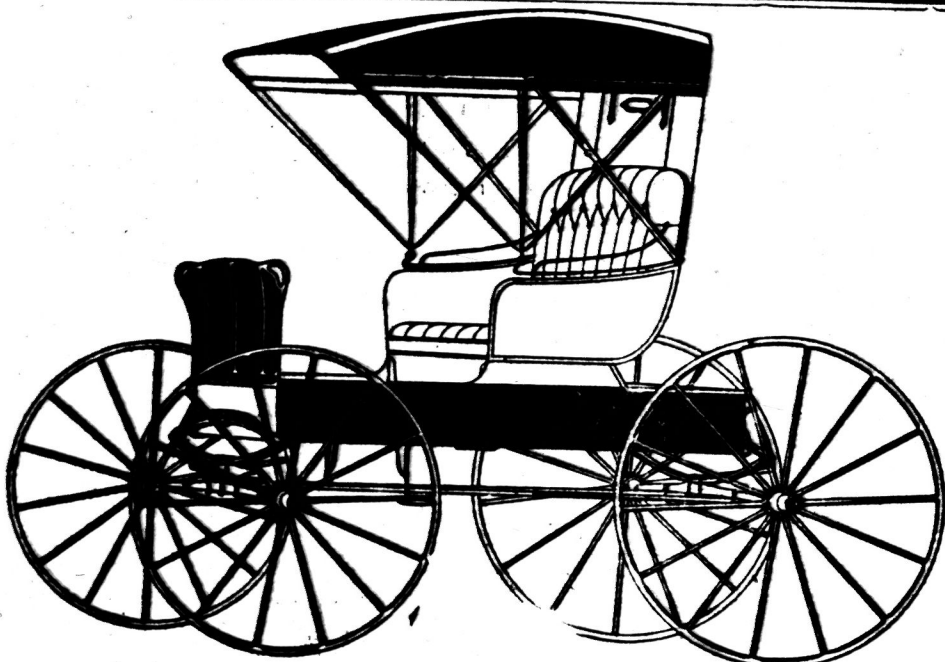

Will Rob River to Extend City.

Plan under consideration to Make Montreal Island a Mile Longer by Filling in Waterfront. Would add Million Dollars worth of Land and give more space for Docking Ships.—Contra-Band Discovered at St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary.—City Pays Large May Day Bill.—Explosive Socks Civilization's Latest Danger—Fortune made from Puzzles

Montreal, May 1st.—With the problem of accommodating a population five years hence staring her in the face, Montreal is planning to rob Father Neptune of nearly a square mile of territory, in an effort to provide additional room. In the case of many smaller cities the plan in question simply proposes reclamation. In this case the reclamation will be from the river involving an amount of land which will be worth something like a million dollars. The idea originated with an engineer who has acted in a consulting capacity in the erection of some of the largest buildings in the city, and has made a specialty of foundation and caisson work. His idea, in brief, is to lengthen the island of Montreal by the erection of sea walls, behind which the space could be filled in by pumping sand from the channel. Chimerical as the scheme may sound at first hearing there appears to be no reason why it should not be carried out, since the value of the made land will far exceed the cost of its creation. Of course until borings and surveys have been made it is impossible to more than roughly estimate the cost of such an undertaking, but it is believed that it would not only pay for itself but would leave a handsome profit beside.

BAN LIQUOR STORE IN PRISON

It is well over a year since Johnny Woods, an expert second-storey man and false key burglar, stepped out to freedom and announced that all was not as it should be behind the walls of St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary where he had been confined for the five years previous for robbing the home of Ex-Mayor Ekers whilst His Worship and family were abroad. Johnny is a smooth well educated young Englishman and he tells a good story. The newspapers took him up and he became famous in a night. Briefly he charged that cocaine, rum, dope of any kind, and pipes to smoke it with, dainties, tobacco, even knives and razors, were bartered and exchanged within the walls of the "pen" as freely as they would be outside. Coin of the realm was the standard of trade, although, if short an ordinary plug of tobacco cut into ten slices, stood for 50 cents. From outside appearances Johnny's tales did not ruffle one whit the equanimity of the prison officials, the inspectors nor the Department of Justice, but it has been learned since that, almost as soon as he had spoken, a searching investigation was ordered through the Dominion Police. Now it turns out, matters are even worse than Johnny pictured them. One guard had the audacity to enter into partnership with a convict to run a barroom. The guard smuggled in the firewater by the "underground route" and the prisoner peddled it, his place of business being a well concealed cave in the huge coal pile standing in a cor-

ner of the walled yard. A hospital orderly sold cocaine and morphine from the hospital stores. A cook when discharged after his time was up, walked out with \$700 in his pocket although he had not a cent when he was sentenced, all of it made by selling dainties and extra rations to the wealthier inmates. Several guards have already been suspended and a general shakeup and reorganization is being brought about behind those high grey walls.

PAY LARGE INTEREST BILL

Cheques totalling \$913,397.51 are being sent out from the City Hall as a cheerful May Day present from the city to its various creditors. The whole sum comprises Montreal's half yearly payment of interest on the various civic loans, including interest on the loans of the several municipalities which were last year annexed to the city. Nearly \$2,000,000 are expended every year in this way. The sum of \$24,509 1/2, 4d. goes to the Bank of Montreal in London, £19,304, 2s, 3d goes to the National Bank of Scotland in London and £46, 0s, 6d. goes to the Bank of Canada in Edinburgh.

The foregoing amounts are equivalent to \$653,632.25 in Canadian currency, and the balance of the interest is made up as follows: Coupons payable in New York \$66,595.50, coupons payable in Montreal \$118,103.48, registered stock dividends payable in Montreal \$94 116.28; Catholic School Commission coupons \$11,000.

EXPLOSIVE SOCKS

That various citizens throughout the country may be unsuspecting wearers of gun cotton neckties and explosive socks, liable to blow up at any moment, is the startling possibility just brought to light here. Nor is the feminine sex immune from the danger since petticoates may likewise be articles of destruction. This unexpected condition of affairs has been discovered through a local protest recently filed against the manufacture of artificial silk from cellulose, in which it appears that there is a possibility that almost any article of wearing apparel made to imitate real silk may actually be explosive. There are several processes it appears according to the protest by which artificial silk is produced from cellulose. One process employs nitro-cellulose which is really nothing more than soluble gun cotton. From it the threads to be used in manufacture are drawn in ether or alcohol. After the thread has been drawn and is ready for wearing it is supposed to be denitrated. If it is, it is entirely safe. If it is not, it may be exceedingly dangerous, for it then remains nothing less than gun cotton spun into a fabric. So in the future it may be worth while to refrain from stamping the "near silk" clad foot or yanking viciously at the cravat of the same material, even no casualties from explosive garments have yet been reported.
